ABOUT GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the College was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. The College is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises more than 8,000 members in 58 churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

The 60-acre rural, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland has undergone major expansion in the last ten years with nine new buildings constructed at a total investment of nearly \$10 million. The new facilities include a \$2.7 million sports complex, an \$800,000 academic building, two residence halls in a \$1.25 million project, a \$1.3 million fine arts/religion center, a \$170,000 television center, a \$520,000 dining commons/student center expansion, a \$320,000 residence hall, and a \$2.6 million chapel/auditorium opened in the fall of 1982. A new \$100,000 all-weather track has been added, along with a new athletic field complex including baseball field, two softball diamonds and soccer field, completed in 1981. To be completed this year is the new \$2.5 million M. J. Murdock Learning Resource Center.

College enrollment is 705.

Accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the College offers 28 majors in seven divisions: Education, Fine and Applied Arts, Language Arts, Natural Science, Religion, Social Science, and Physical Education. George Fox is one of 13 members of the national Christian College Consortium. The College has a student-faculty ratio of 13-1.

George Fox students come from 14 states and 8 foreign countries. Nearly 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The College's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.

COACH CRAIG TAYLOR

Craig Taylor is in his seventh season as head coach for the GFC women's basketball team. A 1974 George Fox graduate, he also is the College's softball coach, the NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year in that sport in 1985, guiding his teams to post-season play three of the last six years.

Taylor, 36, rejoined the George Fox PE and coaching staff in 1981 after previously serving for three years (1976-79) as baseball coach and assistant basketball coach for men. He has a master's degree in education from Linfield College and is working on a PhD at Oregon State. While at George Fox as a student he was named Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding PE Major. He was a member and co-captain of GFC's 1973 NAIA District 2 champion basketball team.

As Lady Bruin basketball coach Taylor has a 78-74 record, including 12-14 last season.



ASST. COACH JODI NOFZIGER

Jodi Nofziger, a 1983 graduate of Judson Baptist College, is assistant women's basketball coach for George Fox College.

Nofziger, who has been at George Fox since 1986 as the athletic office secretary, adds coaching responsibilities with seven-year coach Craig Taylor.

After graduating from Western Mennonite High School in 1979, Nofziger spent two years at Hesston College in Hesston, Kan., before attending Judson Baptist. She earned a bachelor of science degree in psychology. At Judson, she was basketball captain for two years, and was the team's most valuable player for two years.

During the last few years she was dean of the girls' dorm at Western Mennonite, near Salem, and coached girls' varsity basketball. Last year, her Pioneer team was 9-10, and finished fourth in the West Valley League.

Her coaching responsibilities for the Lady Bruins include working with the guards, doing off-court organizational business, scouting, and recruiting.



GFC ATHLETICS

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the College in baseball, basketball, track, cross country, and soccer. Women students compete in volleyball, basketball, track, softball, and cross country.

George Fox College competes as an independent on the varsity level. Its schedules are coordinated with the Northwest Conference and with other independents in the Northwest. George Fox is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), District 2, and the National Christian College Athletic Association, Region 8.

For students not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, softball, racquetball, and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field, which includes a football/soccer field and new all-weather rubberized track; and tennis courts. An athletic field complex containing baseball diamond, two softball fields, soccer field, and archery range was completed in 1981.

Wheeler Center, completed in 1977 in a \$2.7 million project, includes the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for up to 2,500; multipurpose, class, and weight rooms; faculty and administrative offices; handball courts; dressing and therapy rooms.

NAIA DISTRICT 2

George Fox College athletic teams compete in District 2 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Fifteen teams make up the district, all but two within the state of Oregon.

This is the second year of a major change in district membership and organization. Four Hawaii teams have dropped from District 2 to form their own new district. Members of NAIA District 2: College of Idaho, Columbia Christian College, Concordia College, Eastern Oregon State College, George Fox College, Lewis and Clark College, Linfield College, Northwest Nazarene College, Oregon Institute of Technology, Pacific University, Southern Oregon State College, Warner Pacific College, Western Baptist College, Western Oregon State College and Willamette University.

District championship playoffs will involve the top eight teams, based on "Power Rating" standings of the 13 colleges playing basketball. The top seeded team will host the single-elimination tournament.

On the national level, the NAIA is a completely autonomous association that administers programs leading to national championships in 10 events for women. The women's division was established in 1980.

Started in 1940, the NAIA is headquartered in Kansas City, Mo. The NAIA is governed by two bodies. The Council of Presidents, composed of one president from each of the 32 districts, is responsible for fiscal matters, academic standards and the supervision of the national staff. The 10-person Executive Committee, elected by the membership, is responsible for organizing championship events and overseeing the committees and association.

THIS IS WHERE THE GAME IS PLAYED

George Fox College is in its eleventh year in the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education. Completed in June 1977, the \$2.7 million, 55,000-square-foot complex is the College's largest building. It contains the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium, the Bruin home court.

The sports center was designed by noted architect Pietro Bel-luschi, with a wooded canyon setting chosen as the center's location. The building features wood products and a large window area overlooking the adjacent natural terrain.

Three times larger than Hester Gymnasium, which it replaced, the Wheeler Center features a 116 x 174-foot gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for 2,500 spectators. The gymnasium ceilings are 32 feet over the hardwood maple floor. The gym provides three volleyball courts and ten badminton courts. The building is entered on two levels—ground level on the east side through the nine doors for the general public and after crossing a 200-foot bridge; and on the second floor on the west side for campus personnel. There is a two-floor lobby featuring oak parquet floors.

Contained on the upper level are athletic administration and faculty offices, staff room, and class, weight, and multipurpose rooms. The lower level contains a concession area and ticket sales area, dressing rooms, team rooms, laundry, equipment-issuing room, and storage space. An east wing of the building houses two handball courts.

The building is named for long-time Oregon lumberman Coleman H. Wheeler, former chairman of the board of Willamette Industries. The gymnasium is named for board member James Miller and his wife, Lila. He is the former president of Cascadia Lumber Co. The building was dedicated Oct. 17, 1977.

THE BRUIN NICKNAME

George Fox College is represented by the nickname and mascot "Bruin." But it's not always been so, even though it should have been. The nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the College's predecessor) was established. The small cub was captured in the coast range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member. When it grew to adulthood it was kept in a pit in what is now known as Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When it deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling, so it was left sitting in a corner. Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continues 100 years later. "Bruin Junior," a replica, under a set of guidelines passed down for years, is fought over periodically in class competition, with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag to athletic teams came into popularity with sports writers because of the College's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with a mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students, and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.
