Aiming for the Top...

Bruins return strong nucleus in bid to challenge for conference crown

With seven starters and 11 letter-winners returning, the George Fox University Bruins are hopeful of challenging for their first-ever Northwest Conference women's soccer crown in 2000.

The Bruins finished 11-8 overall and were fourth in the NWC with a 7-7 mark last year, including single-goal losses to No. 2-ranked and conference champion Willamette. Close encounters, such as the Willamette series, and an improved defense could give the team a legitimate shot at the top.

"Our returning players have come to fall practice better prepared than last year, and are showing more maturity," notes veteran coach Byron Shenk, who has coached the George Fox Women's soccer program since its inception in 1991 (he's 79-68-11 at George Fox and 183-181-31 in his 30 year career). "The team seems more ready to compete than last year, and I like our front-line payers. The big issue this year will be our depth; that's an area of concern."

Record-Chasing Holub Leads Returning Nucleus

Despite the loss of the team's second- and third-leading scorers, forward Jen Overstreet (7 goals, 5 assists) and midfielder Noelle Miller (5 goals, 6 assists), the latter an Honorable Mention All-Conference selection, the Bruins' offense should not suffer. That's because Karli Holub (Jr., Pleasant Hill, Ore.) and Tori Taylor (So., Portland, Ore.), a pair of outstanding scorers, are back to lead the attack.

Holub, a First Team All-Conference pick and possible All-America candidate, was second in the league in scoring with 30 points (14 goals, 2 assists) last year after leading the NWC in scoring as a freshman. She already ranks second on the all-time George Fox list for points (67) and goals (29), and should easily surpass Gegi Bonera's records (79 points, 32 goals) this season.

Taylor came on strong at the end of the year with three goals in her final four games, finished with 12 points (5 goals, 2 assists), and will be counted on to continue her offensive output from her midfield position.

"Karli and Tori are two of the most aggressive, hustling players I've ever had, and we know we're going to get a few goals from them," Shenk affirms, "but we must also get some goals from the other midfielders, and maybe even a few backs."

Two returning midfielders who Shenk hopes can step up their offensive output are Rachel Denning (So., Boring, Ore.), who produced 8 points (2 goals, 4 assists) in her first year, and three-year starter Ashleigh Hughes (Sr., Portland, Ore.), who Shenk says "must develop more consistency in the middle."

On defense, the Bruins lost Second

Team All-Conference defender Megan Diefenbaugh to graduation, but return Honorable Mention All-NWC Beth Liljenberg (Jr., Portland, Ore.), Erin Oates (Sr., Grover Beach, Calif.), and part-time starter Samara Thornburg (So., Tigard, Ore.) to give the team an experienced backfield.

"Beth is coming into her own as one of the best defenders in the conference," says Shenk. "Erin is one of our captains this year, giving us lots of leadership both on and off the field. Samara is probably our most improved player from last year to this and has been playing very well."

As the Bruins' last line of defense, goalkeeper Cori Wulf (So., Salem, Ore.), who played every minute of every game last year, has shown steady improvement. "Cori is more aggressive coming off the line and has improved on crosses," Shenk notes, "but we've got to hope she can stay injury-free, because we have no backup goalie."

Returning to provide depth and to challenge for starting roles are forwards Mindy Venable (So., Newberg, Ore.) and Anna Carlson (So., Beaverton,

Ore.), and defender Kelly McCabe (Sr., Camas, Wash.). "Mindy is a talented athlete, but still very young in her knowledge of the game," Shenk comments. "Anna has improved as a forward, and she moves the ball well and is more of a feeder than a scorer. Kelly is steady and reliable and gives us some senior leadership."

One or Two Freshmen Could Start

At least one or two of the Bruin newcomers are expected to start, with the best candidates to emerge in the regular lineup being Brooke Pitner (Fr., Vancouver, Wash.) and Sara Oates (Fr., Grover Beach, Calif.), Erin's younger sister. "Brooke is our fastest player, with good skills, and very athletic," notes Shenk. "She will probably play a flanker, with Tori on the other side. Sara is a strong scorer who is a good possibility for the other forward position if Anna doesn't claim it."

Two newcomers to the program did not play soccer the past couple of years. Sarah Jones (Jr., Lake Oswego, Ore.) transferred from Westmont College; Darcey Stocking (Fr., The Dalles, Ore.) played basketball at George Fox last winter. Both players have been hampered by pre-season injuries, but will contend for playing time on defense.

Others who could get opportunities before the season is over include Shayda Rohani (Fr., Oregon City, Ore.) and Sydney Seyfert (Fr., Lewistown, Mont.), who can play either midfield or forward, midfielder Kristen Gooch (Fr., Taylorsville, Utah), and defender Nicole Fitzhugh (Fr., Coos Bay, Ore.)

Summary

Assessing his team as a whole, Shenk says, "Defense is still a bit of a concern, because we're going to have to rely on it more this year than in the past several seasons, and our depth is not as extensive as it has been.

"One of the things I do like about

our team is that they play more physically, more aggressively this year than last. Another strength is our team unity, and I'm not talking about just

typical team spirit; these players really enjoy being with one another. I think our new assistant coach, Heather Thibodeau, is one of the reasons behind our great team chemistry; she relates so well to our players, and because she comes from a very successful Division I program at the University of Portland, they pay close attention to her.

"All in all, I think it's going to be a fun year."

Background on the Bruin Nickname

George Fox's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887, just two years after Pacific Academy (the University's predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.

When it grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. After the bear escaped one too many times, it was turned into steak for the dining table, and the hide was preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the bearskin deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling so the pelt was left standing in a corner.

Students later found the old Bruin skin and began skirmishes over its ownership, a tradition that continues today. "Bruin Junior," a replica hide, is fought over periodically in class competitions, under a set of guidelines passed down for years. The class that is able to drag the Bruin replica physically off campus is declared the rightful owner until the bearskin is next "flashed."

Despite the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, because of the University's church affiliation, the "Quaker" tag for athletic teams became popular with sportswriters. The Quaker nickname was used for years, along with the mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

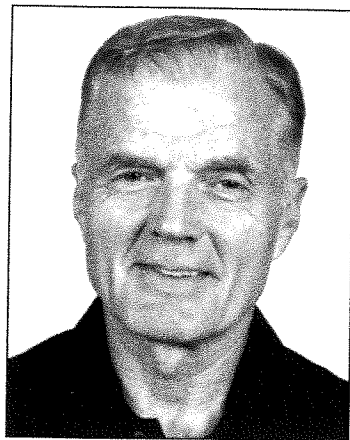

Byron Shenk

Head Coach

As the only head coach in the history of the George Fox University women's soccer program, Byron Shenk completes his first decade at the helm this season.

Shenk initiated the school program in 1991 with a squad made up almost exclusively of freshmen, but the team won its first game and advanced to the NAIA District 2 semifinals at season's end. The next year, George Fox was ranked in the NAIA Top 20 poll after upsetting No. 1-ranked and defending national champion Pacific Lutheran University. The 1992 and 1993 teams advanced to the NAIA District 2 title game, and the 1994 team was ranked in the NAIA top 20 for both offense and defense, outscoring opponents 58-17.



The Bruins had their best season ever two years ago, setting a school record for wins during a 15-4-2 season. The team went 14 games without a loss at one stretch, finished second in the Northwest Conference, advanced to the NAIA West Regionals for the first time, and ended the year with a No. 10 ranking in the final NAIA poll.

Coaching honors have come to Shenk with the team's successes. In 1992, he shared the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Coach of the Year award for the West Region. He was named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year in 1992 and 1993. In 1998, he was voted Coach of the Year by his NWC peers, and received NAIA West Region Coach of the Year honors as chosen by the NSCAA.

Upon graduation from Goshen College in Indiana in 1963, he began his coaching career with a three-year stint at his alma mater. From 1966-1970, he worked in India with the Mennonite Board of Missions, then returned to coaching at Eastern Mennonite College, where he served from 1970-1987. He came to George Fox in 1990 and started the women's soccer program in 1991. He has compiled an overall record of 183-181-37 in his 30 years of coaching, including a 79-68-11 mark in nine seasons at George Fox.

Shenk earned a doctorate in education in sports medicine from the University of Virginia in 1990 and a master's in physical education from the University of Oregon. His players are certainly well cared for, as he is also a certified athletic trainer and strength and conditioning specialist. He also serves as chair of George Fox's department of health and human performance.

Shenk and his wife, Ina, live in McMinnville, Ore., where he is an active elder in the First Mennonite Church.

After making the Portland team as a walk-on in 1996, Thibodeau played defender for four years on Pilot teams that went to the Final Four in both 1996 and 1998.

A native of Yuba City, Calif., Thibodeau graduated from Portland in May 2000 with a B.S. in life science and a minor in business administration. She recently returned from a one-and-a-half month trip to Malaysia and Australia on the University of Portland's Entrepreneur's Scholar Program, an experience she anticipates will help toward her long-range goal of entering the field of biotech enterprises.

Todd Williams

Goalkeeper Coach



Todd Williams enters his third season as coach of both the men's and women's goalkeepers. As a George Fox goalkeeper himself

from 1990-93, Williams posted a career goals-against average of 1.69 with three shutouts, which ranks fourth in team history.

Williams earned a bachelor's degree in biology from George Fox in 1994. He now works for Canby Companies Insurance. He is married to former GFU women's soccer player Lisel Goertzen, and they live in Tigard, Ore.

Athletic Director

Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his 13th year as George Fox University athletic director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for a total of 27 years as a player, coach, and professor.

Taylor, 49, first came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, receiving honors as the Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1976-79, Taylor was the Bruins' baseball coach while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He worked at a sporting goods retailing firm from 1979-81, but returned to George Fox as coach of the women's basketball team from 1981-93, producing a 162-155 record. He also coached the softball team from 1981-88 and again in 1990, compiling a 77-99-1 record. In 1985, he was named NAIA District 2 Softball Coach of the Year.

At George Fox, Taylor is responsible for athletic department functions, including budgeting, department and sports center management, and eligibility and compliance with George Fox, Northwest Conference, and NCAA regulations. In 1992, he was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the Year.

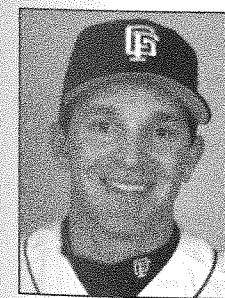

Dale Isaak joined the George Fox staff in 1995 as head trainer and assistant professor in the department of health and human perform-



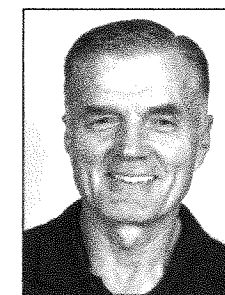

University

The University

George Fox University, an evangelical Christian liberal arts college, is expanding, both in size and reputation. One of the fastest-growing institutions of higher learning in the United States, George Fox has seen its enrollment more than quadruple in the past 14 years, increasing from 549 in 1986 to 2,636 students in the fall of 2000.

Since 1986, George Fox University has been named one of "America's Best Colleges" 12 times by U.S. News & World

Report. In 1999, George Fox ranked second overall and third in academic reputation among Western regional liberal arts colleges. The magazine also named the University one of the region's



best values among schools in its category.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, in which the University pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.

The school's history began in 1885 when Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy. It was during those early days that George Fox's most prominent alumnus attended the school — Herbert Hoover, who later became the 30th president of the United States.

The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction and the name became Pacific College. In 1949, because of the many schools in the West with "Pacific" in their title, another change was made, this time to George Fox College, honoring the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of 35 undergraduate majors and nine graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox is located in Newberg, Oregon (pop. 17,355), 25 miles southwest of Portland, the state's largest metropolitan center of 1.7 million, and 32 miles northwest of Salem, the state capital.

Dr. David Brandt
University President

David Brandt, George Fox University's 11th president, came to the university in August 1998 after three years as president of Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kan.

Brandt has international experience, traveling annually to Daystar University in Nairobi, Kenya, an institution he helped organize and for which he continues to serve on the United States board.

Brandt has experience at four other Christian colleges and describes himself as "a 'lifer' in Christian higher education." He has been vice president and provost at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn.; dean and vice president for academic affairs at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.; a physics instructor and chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Gordon College in Wenham, Mass.; and a physics instructor at Wheaton (Ill.) College.

Brandt did his undergraduate work in physics at Wheaton. He earned a master of science degree in physics in 1962 from the University of Oklahoma, and a doctorate in physics in 1971 from the same university.

Brandt also taught physics in 1962-63 at the University of Omaha in Nebraska; was a demonstrator in physics at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ont., Canada in 1968-69; was a part-time engineer at Raytheon Co. in Sudbury, Mass., between 1972 and 1974; and was a consulting engineer for International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. in Roanoke, Va. between 1975 and 1977. His research there on fiber optics resulted in two patent applications.



Athletics

Curtis and Margaret Morse Complex

George Fox University soccer, baseball, and softball teams have played home games on the three playing fields that comprise the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex since 1989.

Located across from the Wheeler Sports Center on Fulton Street and Villa Road on the northeast corner of the campus, the complex was renovated using a major donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse, avid supporters of Bruin athletics. The Morse family has had a long association with George Fox, four generations of the family having attended the Newberg school.

The Morse Soccer Field, home to both the men's and women's soccer teams, has a natural-grass surface, with temporary bleachers scattered around the field for seating up to 500 spectators, and an electronic scoreboard in the southeast corner.

Fund-raising efforts are now under way for a further renovation of the Morse Athletic Complex that will eventually result in new surfaces for the fields, increased and improved seating, and lights for night games, placing the Bruins' home facilities among the best in the nation at the Division III level.



1999 Review

Hot Start Propels Bruins To Another Winning Season

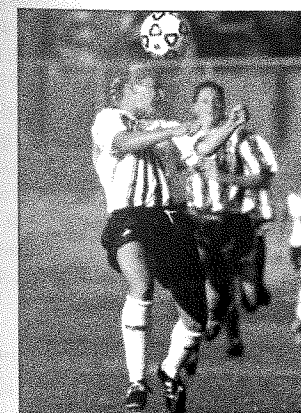
A red-hot start that was marred only by a loss to a top national power proved to be the spark that carried the George Fox University women's soccer team to its second straight winning season in 1999, setting the stage for perhaps even better things to come.

Start Strong Leads to Winning Season

Fueled by a 5-1 start, the Bruins went on to claim a winning 11-8 mark for the season, despite going only 3-5 over the final half of the campaign.

The year began with road wins at Western Oregon, Western Baptist, and La Verne before the Bruins ran into defending NAIA national champion Azusa Pacific and fell in a 4-0 shutout. The team rebounded to edge Concordia-Portland 2-1 in its home opener when Tori Taylor scored with only one second left, then started Northwest Conference play with a win at Pacific.

The Bruins got off to a 4-2 start in conference play by adding wins over Whitman, Pacific Lutheran, and Linfield, but went 3-5 the rest of the way to finish fourth in the league at 7-7. Included were a pair of one-goal losses

to No. 2-ranked and eventual conference champion Willamette, serving notice that the Bruins were competitive with anyone. The season ended with a 4-1 thumping of Yamhill County rival Linfield at home.

The Bruins played four overtime games during the season, going 3-1 with wins over Western Baptist, Whitman, and PLU. The only loss was in double overtime to Whitworth.

Individual Highlights and Honors

Sophomore Karli Holub, after leading the NWC in scoring as a freshman, finished second this time around with 30 points, averaging 1.58 points per game. She had a three-goal game against La Verne, and was second in the conference in goals scored with 14. For the second straight year, she was named All-NWC First Team. Holub stands second all-time at George Fox in total points (67) and goals (29).

Senior defender Megan Diefenbaugh, a four-year starter, earned All-NWC Second Team honors, and was a GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America Second Team choice as well.

The Bruins had two players receive Honorable Mention All-Conference, sophomore defender Beth Liljenberg and sophomore midfielder Noelle Miller. Liljenberg played all but one minute of the entire season, while Miller, the team leader in assists (6) who had five goals and 16 total points, also had a three-goal game against Western Oregon.

Senior forward Jen Overstreet was second on the team in goals (7), assists (5), and points (19), finishing her career sixth in all-time points (39) and goals



First Team All-Conference forward Karli Holub was second in the NWC in scoring with 30 points.

(15), and tied for seventh in assists (9).

Freshman midfielder Tori Taylor also reached double figures in points with 12 (five goals, two assists), while freshman goalkeeper Cori Wulf played every minute of every game and recorded four shutouts.

Holub was named the team's Most Valuable Player and Best Offensive Player, Diefenbaugh was chosen Best Defensive Player, Taylor and junior defender Erin Oates were the Most Inspirational Players, and freshman midfielder Rachel Denning was both Most Improved and Outstanding Rookie.

Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. 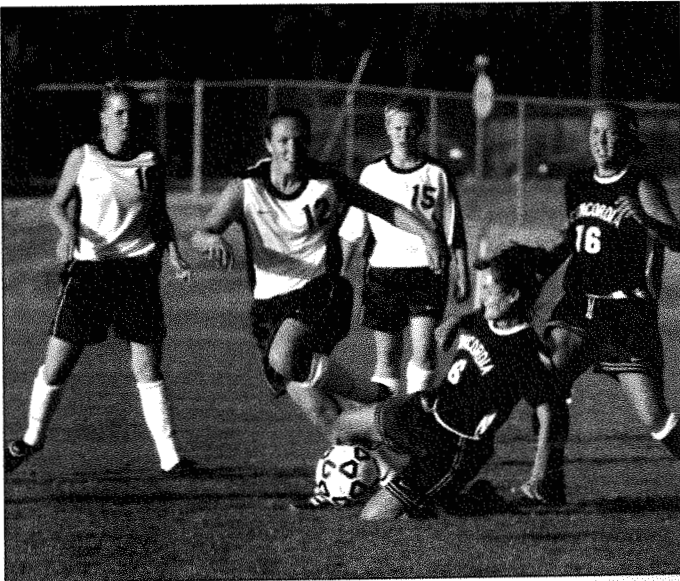
- physical conditioning

More than 15 percent of George Fox's undergraduate students participate in the school's 13 varsity sports, seven for women and six for men.
