George Fox College, in its 104th year, is one of "America's Best Colleges." Six times it has been given that designation by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine. In 1994 GFC was ranked second in academic reputation among Western Regional Liberal Arts Colleges, including colleges and universities from Oklahoma to Hawaii. The magazine in 1993 also named George Fox to its list of "The Nation's Most Efficient Institutions," second in the West.

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers for a Christian education of their children. They established Pacific Academy in 1885, while the college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the College was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. GFC is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises nearly 8,000 members in 53 churches in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

George Fox is one of the nation's fastest-growing colleges. Enrollment has risen from 549 in 1986 to 1,658 in the fall of 1994, a 202 percent increase.

GFC students come from 30 states, one possession and 10 nations. More than 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

The College's undergraduate program is administered

through three schools: Humanities, Natural and Behavioral Sciences, and Professional Studies. The 15 departments offer 34 majors with more than 400 courses. An off-campus degree-completion program in

the management of human resources enrolls working adults in an evening program with classes in Portland, Salem and Eugene. The graduate program offers a Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) degree in clinical psychology, a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.), a Master of Education (M.Ed.), a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.), and a Master of Arts in Christian Studies.

The 74-acre, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland has undergone major expansion in recent years with 13 new buildings constructed. Part of a \$16 million Centennial Campaign, the \$5.3 million Edwards-Holman Science Center opened in the fall of 1994.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work and medical fields. The College's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.





George Fox College maintains one of the Northwest's premier small-college athletic programs. In the past five years, George Fox athletes have earned 52 NAIA All-American awards and 23 academic All-American Scholar-Athlete honors.

In the 1993-94 seasons, all 11 George Fox teams qualified for post-season play, with softball, women's cross country and men's soccer winning NAIA District 2 titles. Baseball, men's cross country and women's soccer finished as district runners-up. George Fox has won district titles in seven different sports during the 1990s. At the end of 1993-94, every GFC coach had been named district or conference coach of the year at least once.


George Fox's highest national team finish came in the fall of 1992, when the women's cross country team maintained a No. 1 ranking for its entire season before finishing as national runner-up.

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the College in baseball, basketball, track, cross country and soccer. Women's teams are fielded in volleyball, basketball, track, softball, cross country and soccer.

For students not participating in the varsity program, a

complete intramural program is available, including flag football, basketball, volleyball, racquetball, indoor soccer, skiing, floor hockey and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field, which received a new polyurethane surface in the fall of 1993; and the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex containing baseball diamond, softball field and soccer field. In 1994, five tennis courts were installed in preparation for the addition of tennis as a varsity sport.

NATIONAL AFFILIATION

George Fox College joined the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) in 1965, but currently is applying for membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III.

George Fox and other Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges institutions will have provisional dual membership in the NCAA and NAIA for the 1995-96 season and full NCAA membership by 1998.

GFC's men's and women's basketball teams currently play in NAIA Division II, while the college's other nine sports are not divided into divisions.

The NAIA is a completely autonomous association administering programs leading to 13 men's and 12 women's national championships. The NAIA includes 391 accredited four-year colleges and universities in 49 states and Canada. The colleges are grouped in nine regions and 44 conferences.

NAIA national headquarters are located in Tulsa, Okla. The NAIA is governed by two bodies. The Council of Presidents, composed of one president from each district, is responsible for fiscal matters and supervision of the national staff. George Fox president Edward F. Stevens represented NAIA District 2 from 1987 to 1993 and was one of the five college presidents selected to serve on the NAIA Council of Presidents Executive Committee, serving as chairman in 1992. The National Coordinating Council, elected by the membership, is responsible for organizing championship events, maintaining academic standards, and overseeing the committees and associations.

CONFERENCE AFFILIATION

George Fox College is playing its second and last season in the Cascade Collegiate Conference (CCC). In 1995-96, George Fox is joining the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges (NCIC).

The CCC is made up of nine public and private colleges: George Fox, Albertson College of Idaho, Concordia College, Eastern Oregon State College, Northwest Nazarene College, Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon State College, Western Baptist College, and Western Oregon State College.

Eight teams will participate in the Far West Regional Tournament held May 16-20 at Lewis-Clark State College in Lewiston, Idaho. The NCIC, Cascade and Golden State conferences will each receive two berths in the tournament. An independent grouping will have one automatic berth determined by the top independent team in the Far West ratings. A final at-large berth will be available to the next-highest ranked team.

Winner of the regional tournament will advance to the NAIA national tournament May 26-June 1 in Sioux City, Iowa.

The NAIA Council of Presidents voted in September of 1993 to eliminate the district format by which teams had qualified for national tournaments since 1965 in favor of the affiliated conference structure. Until this season, GFC was a member of NAIA District 2, which divided into the Cascade Collegiate Conference and Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges.

The NCIC includes Lewis & Clark College, Linfield College, Pacific University, Pacific Lutheran University, Whitman College, Whitworth College and Willamette University. University of Puget Sound will join during the 1996-97 season.

Sweet 1994 Season Leaves Bitter Taste

For the George Fox baseball team, 1994 was short and sweet.

The Bruins tasted plenty of success compiling a 31-13 season mark — GFC's best ever. More doubles, triples, home runs and stolen bases were recorded this season than in any prior year. In all, eight individual and nine team records were tied or broken. The hard-swinging Bruins earned the respect of the NAIA District 2 coaches as well. Nearly half of the players voted onto the all-district team (seven out of 15 selected) came off the George Fox squad. Nationally, the Bruins picked up 45 points in the final NAIA national poll, ranking GFC 28th, highest in school history.

But the season ended earlier than hoped when the Bruins were denied George Fox's fourth consecutive NAIA District 2 championship.

GFC opened the district tournament in impressive fashion, blitzing Concordia College 26-5 and dispatching Linfield College 7-1.

But Albertson College — which GFC edged for the Cascade Conference title on the final day of the regular season — gave the Bruins their first district tournament loss since 1990 after GFC's scheduled starting pitcher came down with the flu the night before. The Coyotes prevailed 11-3.

In the losers' bracket that night, the Bruins bumped Western Oregon from the playoffs 9-3. With just two teams remaining, the Bruins needed two con-

secutive wins to knock Albertson from the double-elimination tournament.

After ten innings, George Fox came up one strike short of winning and forcing a second game. With two outs and the bases loaded, a two-run double to the left center field gap gave the Coyotes the title, 8-7.

"I thought we had the better baseball club," said GFC head coach Pat Casey. "But we weren't the better team in the tournament. It's just disappointing for the players that they didn't play well during the tournament."

At home, the Bruins were 12-0 in 1994 and 19-1 during the past two years. George Fox scored 400 runs this past season, an average of 9.1 a game. The Bruins allowed 209, an average of 4.8.

Casey again loaded up a heavyweight schedule for his charges: more than half of George Fox's losses came against NCAA opponents. Versus fellow NAIA opponents, the Bruins were 27-6. Under Casey's guidance during the last seven years, George Fox has a 155-54-1 record (.742) when facing NAIA opponents.

George Fox third baseman Mike Nadeau, a junior from Portland, was honored as NAIA District 2's Player of the Year. Nadeau completed his third year at George Fox with 10 doubles, four triples, two home runs, 31 RBIs and a .364 batting average. His 28 stolen bases in 33 attempts and 184 at bats both set school records. He is a repeat selection on the all-district first team and was honorable mention as a freshman.

Center fielder Michael Thompson, a junior from Bellevue, Wash., was named an NAIA honorable mention All-American. Thompson had the third-best batting average on the GFC team, .371. He finished his first season in a Bruin uniform with 59 hits, 12 doubles, five triples, six home runs, and 14 stolen bases in 15 attempts.

The other five Bruins named to the all-district team were second baseman Aaron Knotts, a junior from Sandy, Ore.; shortstop Adam Kershaw, a junior from Salt Lake City, Utah; outfielder Chris Wakeland, a sophomore from St. Helens, Ore.; and a pair of pitchers who transferred from Portland State University: Jeremy Greene, a junior from Portland, and Troy Schrenk, a sophomore from Aurora, Ore.

New-Look Bruins Begin New Era

George Fox baseball looks different this year.

It's a year of transition for the Bruins, who have won seven consecutive league or conference titles and three of the last four NAIA District 2 championships.

Most of the players are new and so is the coach.

Jeff Hollamon, who won 1993 Portland Interscholastic League Coach of the Year honors at Roosevelt High School, is at the helm for a one-season stint as interim coach. He'll oversee a different team than last year's district runner-up 31-13 squad that swatted away nearly every school hitting record. Three Bruins signed professional contracts last summer, including NAIA District 2 Player of the Year Mike Nadeau.

All but five lettermen — two of them starters — are gone, but the high-pressure expectations aren't there either.

"We don't have the athletes they had last year," says Hollamon. "We're not an overpowering team and we're not a weak team. I believe we have the potential to be a good baseball team. It just depends how good we decide to be."

It hasn't been easy following former coach Pat Casey, who took the head job at Oregon State University.

"We've been getting through the jet-lag," says Hollamon. "But we can be successful."

The veterans can be found at second

base, on the mound and behind the plate.

Tony Iranshad (Sr., Milwaukie IIS, Ore.) will be GFC's defensive anchor at second base. He has the quickest hands on the team and gained significant experience in his three previous years at George Fox. Hollamon calls him the captain of the infield.

Catcher Ryan Corey (Jr., Hermiston IIS, Ore.) started last year and won all-conference recognition. He gives the team leadership. "Nobody on the team works as hard as he does," says Hollamon. "He has to be one of the top catchers in the league."

Pitcher Brian Meyers (Sr., Sherwood IIS, Ore.) has lots of velocity on his pitch and was drafted by the Kansas City Royals organization in 1993, but chose to stay at George Fox. He's

dealing with a shoulder injury but will get lots of time when he heals.

Matt Avery (Jr., Tigard IIS, Ore.) returns to the Bruins' starting rotation after an injury redshirt season where he underwent surgery on his elbow. He gives GFC much-needed experience. His brother John Avery played at George Fox in 1992 and signed with the Atlanta Braves organization in 1993.

There won't be many times this year when Danny Graham (Sr., Federal Way IIS, Wash.) isn't on the field. He begins the season as GFC's top pitcher and will play first base and occasionally right field. He was the winning pitcher when George Fox won the Cascade Conference title last year in the final game of the regular season.

A key addition to the Bruins this year is shortstop Marty Beyers (Jr., North Delta HS, Surrey, B.C.). He was one of Casey's top recruits and gives GFC a good double-play combination with Iranshad. "He fills a big void for us," says Hollamon. "We're as good as anybody up the middle."

A converted catcher, Rob Hoover (Jr., West Linn HS, Ore.) will man first base.

Joe Gordon (Sr., Simi Valley HS, Calif.) transfers from UCLA and gives the Bruins a good defensive third baseman. "He has the potential to hit the ball out of park," says Hollamon.

The outfield is all new. NAIA honorable mention All-American outfielder Michael Thompson will sit out the year as a medical redshirt after hurting his back lifting weights.

Jeff Janosky (Jr., Kennewick HS, Wash.) comes from Columbia Basin Community College to play center field. "He's got the potential to hit the ball a long ways," says Hollamon. Transferring in from Mt. Hood Community College is Aaron Jaramillo (Jr., Aloha HS, Ore.).

"He can be an impact player," says Hollamon. "He's got a lot of skills. He throws well and he can hit the ball hard."

Ryan Muñoz (Fr., Aloha HS, Ore.) is learning to play right field. A relief pitcher, Muñoz has good athletic ability and great speed. "We needed another guy out there who could run," says Hollamon.

The Bruins will have to change their offensive philosophy a bit. "We have the potential to beat the ball up a

little bit, but we can't think in terms of being a power-hitting team," says Hollamon. "We need to move people along the bases. He expects Corey. Janosky, Gordon, Iranshad and Jaramillo will be his top hitters.

Staying healthy is a priority since depth is a weakness. GFC's roster, at 21, is smaller than in recent years.

Hollamon says pitching coach Tom Bohlman has put the young Bruin pitchers through boot camp. Six of the nine are freshmen. Two of the top newcomers are Travis Tobin (Fr., Jesuit HS, Beaverton, Ore.) and Nate Fast (Fr., Clovis HS, Fresno, Calif.). "Our veterans are leading them well," says Hollamon. "They've shown a lot of character."


Jeff Hollamon, the 1993 Portland Interscholastic League Coach of the Year at Roosevelt High School, will serve as George Fox's interim head coach for the 1994-95 school year.

He faces the difficult task of following highly successful baseball coach Pat Casey, who departed this summer to take the head baseball job at Oregon State University.

During the past two summers, Hollamon has served as the Director of Baseball at Camp Lenox in Lee, Mass. After four years as Roosevelt's head baseball coach and assistant football coach, Hollamon last year enrolled in classes and served as an assistant baseball coach at Concordia College in Portland.

Hollamon, 38, has coached baseball at various levels. He ran a summer American Legion baseball program in St. John's between 1990 and 1993, winning a district championship in 1990. During a three-year stint as coach, his St. John's Junior State team won the 1989 state championship. His experience also includes instructing at various local baseball camps. A 1974 graduate of Benson High School, Hollamon played football at Oregon Institute of Technology.

"We hired Jeff because he came highly recommended by some very influential people in the Northwest baseball community, including Pat Casey," says GFC Athletic Director Craig Taylor.

Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his seventh year as George Fox College Athletic Director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for 21 years as player, coach and professor. Taylor, 43, came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward on the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to

their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, named both Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a Master of Science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a residence hall director at GFC.

At George Fox, the athletic director is responsible for athletic department functions, including eligibility and compliance with GFC and NAIA regulations, budgeting, and department and sports center management.

Taylor has three children: Leah, a 20-year-old junior at GFC; Bree, 15; and Casey, 5. Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville.



Hal Adrian

Hal Adrian became Associate Director of Athletics at George Fox in 1994. In that position he is responsible for the Bruin Club and general fund-raising, as well as for special projects such as the George Fox Athletic Hall of Fame and sports banquet.

A 1956 graduate of Lewis & Clark College, Adrian taught and coached in the Beaverton School District until 1961 when he joined North Pacific Insurance. Felton also has additional responsibilities as Assistant Director of Public Information.

A magna cum laude graduate, he was named Outstanding Student in Communication Arts and to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. He was sports editor for the student newspaper, The Crescent, for two years and editor as a sophomore.



Future Head Coach Patrick Bailey

Patrick Bailey is scheduled to become the new Bruin baseball coach in 1996.

He comes to George Fox after spending more than a decade building a winning program at West Linn High School.

"Based on past performance at every level he's coached, he'll be successful," says Taylor. "At George Fox, we tend to define success off the field as well as on the field. He's strong in both areas. There wasn't anybody who contacted me who didn't have very good things to say about Pat. He's highly regarded as a teacher, coach and human being."

Bailey is finishing the 1994-95 school year as coach and teacher at West Linn. Four times he has been named Three Rivers League Coach of the Year. He has been at West Linn since 1984 as head baseball coach and assistant football coach. His baseball teams have won five straight league titles and reached the Oregon semifinals in 1989 and 1991. At the beginning of the 1995 season, West Linn was the No. 1-ranked 4A team in Oregon. Since 1989, his combined record as a high school and American Legion baseball coach is 291-98.

He has worked at various baseball camps, and in 1991-92, served as a pitching coach at the University of Portland.

"I'm really excited," says Bailey. "George Fox really matches up with me personality-wise and philosophically."

"As a coach, I want to make sure every kid is making the most of his God-given talent. I want them to be a class act in the classroom and the community. I want the kids to match the school and my personality. I stress to my team we're a family. Family members are more important than themselves. If you're going to be a leader, you must be a servant first."

Former George Fox and current Oregon State University head coach Pat Casey says he approves of his replacement. "I think Pat Bailey will do an outstanding job — in all areas of the game," Casey says. "He's a quality person. I'm tickled he's the guy they chose. His players are very well schooled in the fundamentals of the game. He'll have no problem with the transition. He'll be a good recruiter and he's a good communicator. I think he's a player's coach."

Bailey is a 1974 graduate of Moscow High School in Idaho, where he played football, basketball and baseball.

An outfielder, he attended North Idaho College in Coeur

d'Alene, Idaho, and the University of Idaho on baseball scholarships, starting every game. He graduated in 1978 with a Bachelor of Science degree in business education.

Bailey continued playing semiprofessionally until the age of 28.

He earned a Master of Education degree in curriculum and instruction from the University of Oregon in 1983.

At West Linn, Bailey is a business instructor, and in 1994, was named to Who's Who Among America's Outstanding High School Teachers. Previously he taught and coached at Willamette High School in Eugene, Ore.

At George Fox, Bailey will be an assistant professor of health and human performance.

Bailey and his wife Susan live in West Linn with their children: Alex, 11, and Ann, 8.



Former Head Coach Pat Casey

The man who put George Fox baseball and local Pac-10 teams in the same ballpark now manages one of his former NCAA Division 1 opponents.

Pat Casey, who led the Bruins to seven conference or league titles and three NAIA District 2 championships, now heads the Oregon State University team. Casey's Bruins knocked off OSU in 1992 and last season finished with a 5-8 record versus NCAA opponents.

Casey was right at home in Newberg, where he graduated from high school in 1977 and was an all-Coast Valley League all-star in baseball, basketball and football.

He was drafted by the San Diego Padres after his junior year at the University of Portland, where he was an all-region left fielder.

After seven years in professional baseball, Casey finished his pro career with the AAA Portland Beavers. A center fielder, he hit over .300 at each level.

Casey came to George Fox in 1987 and coached while finishing up his bachelor's degree, earning all-district honors playing basketball for the Bruins.

Under Casey, three Bruins became NAIA honorable mention All-Americans, and 11 George Fox baseball players signed professional baseball contracts. He compiled a 171-113-1 record and was 155-54-1 against other NAIA teams in his seven seasons as George Fox's coach.







CURTIS AND MARGARET MORSE COMPLEX

George Fox College baseball, soccer and softball teams have played home games on the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex since 1989.

Across from Wheeler Sports Center on Fulton Street and Villa Road, the complex was renovated using a donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse. Using labor from Volunteers on Wheels, new dugouts and a press box were constructed for the baseball field.

The Morse family has a long association with George Fox. Four generations have attended the Newberg college.

The baseball diamond was moved to the current location in the early '80s when construction on Bauman Auditorium displaced the old field. For two straight

seasons — while the new field was being put in — George Fox played all games on the road.

The baseball facility continues to improve. In 1991, Smurfit Newsprint Corp., Newberg, donated all lumber for an indoor hitting facility located in the northwest corner of the complex.

The baseball Bruins are tough to beat at Morse Field. George Fox did not lose at home last season, and in the last four seasons has lost just twice to a visiting NAIA opponent.

Field dimensions are 335 feet down the left-field line, 375 in the left-center-field alley, 400 to straight-away center, 370 in right center and 330 down the right-field line.
