Starting Afresh...

Bruins must overcome inexperience for successful 2000 season

With the loss of four starters and one part-time starter, including three All-Conference performers, the George Fox University Bruins will have to overcome a world of inexperience if they are to scale the heights of the Northwest Conference during the 2000 volleyball season.

Last year's team posted a 19-7 record, the 13th

straight winning season for the Bruins; went 12-4 in the conference to tie for second; and just missed an at-large bid to the NCAA Division III Tournament with a tough, five-set loss in the home finale, to Pacific Lutheran, which went on to postseason play. Repeating such efforts will be a real challenge for the Bruins and veteran coach Steve Grant.

"There's no doubt we have some huge holes to fill," admits Grant, whose 18-year record, all at George Fox, is 424-251. "This will be the youngest group I've had in many years, and youth coupled with little experience by the returning players is a difficult combination. Still, we have some potential, and have made significant improvements in pre-season practice, so we have a lot of hope."

Bruins Lose Three All-Conference Players

The Bruins no longer have the services of outside hitter Sharon Barnett and

middle blocker Beth Davis, both First Team All-NWC selections, and Second Team All-NWC middle blocker Wendy

Clark. Barnett was conference Player of the Year for the second year in a row, led the league and was 24th in the nation in kills (4.21 kpg), and ended her four-year career as the all-time Bruin leader in kills (1,449) and digs (1,641). Davis led the NWC in blocks (1.39 bpg), topped the team in digs (275), averaged 3.54 kills a game, and was seventh all-time in career kills (1,123). Both Barnett and Davis were NCAA All-West Region selections, while Davis was a GTE Academic All-America District VIII pick. Clark was 16th in the nation in blocks (1.27) and averaged 2.58 kills per game.

"Barnett and Davis were impact players as freshmen, and we just don't have anyone now who can step in and contribute the way they did in their first year," Grant says.

Also gone are starting defensive specialist Stacie Wilton, who totaled 122 digs, and setter Tristan Nicholas, a part-time starter who was second on the team in assists (419) and assist average (9.31).

Returning Starters Are Young

Shouldering the leadership roles as returning starters are middle blocker Shelly Schultens (So., The Dalles, Ore.) and setter Mindi Yost (So., Sisters, Ore.). Schultens was third on the team in blocks (65, 0.81 bpg), fifth in kills (131), and led the team in service aces (19). Yost led the Bruins in assists (607) with a per-game average of 11.45, which would have led the conference and ranked 20th nationally had she played enough games to qualify.

"Shelly is switching from right outside hitter to middle blocker," Grant notes, "and is rapidly making the adjustments needed to be productive in that spot. Mindi has the potential to be the best defensive setter here since Jamie Suehiro in '93, and she's a solid setter whose decision-making and location are improving day by day. She gives us a solid foundation to build around in a most important position."

Expected to move into the lineup as key players are left outside hitter Jennifer Westerberg (Jr., Vancouver, Wash.), who was third on the team in digs (155) and fourth in kills (135), and right outside hitter Heidi Vander Stoep (Jr., Woodland, Wash.), who recorded 105 digs.

"Jen is our most experienced returner as a junior," says Grant, "and brings some explosiveness to our outside attack. Heidi is a bit short for an outside hitter but is very quick and a pretty good blocker. She's also an excellent defensive player who could see some time as a defensive specialist."

Two other veterans who will compete for playing time at outside hitter are the team's only seniors, Amy Forbes (Sr., Jackson, Wyo.), who had 85 kills and 92 digs, and Bree Stairs (Sr., McMinnville,

Ore.), the daughter of George Fox athletic director Craig Taylor, who had five kills and 45 digs as a reserve.

“Amy has great jumping ability and has been focusing on her jump technique and arm swing, which should increase her production,” says Grant.

“Bree is our team captain, a leader both on and off the court, and can play defensive specialist as well.”

Lynette Domench (So., Battle Ground, Wash.) moved up from the junior varsity in mid-season and showed promise as a middle blocker with 11

kills and four blocks. Says Grant, “Lynette is still trying to adjust to the intricacies of college play, but she’s very athletic and very quick and is constantly improving.

Top Newcomers

With the addition of Lacey Langmade (So., Camas, Wash.) from the junior varsity program and newcomer Nicole Bostic (Fr., Spokane, Wash.), the left outside hitter position will be the team’s deepest this year. “Lacey is a very intelligent player who makes few mistakes, spreads the ball around, and is a good blocker,” Grant says. “Nicole has impressed as a pretty strong hitter, good passer, and with a maturity beyond her years.”

At middle blocker, Blue Mountain Community College transfer Heidi Stuelpnagel (Jr., Portland, Ore.) and rookie Jeni Nelson (Fr., Seattle, Wash.) will compete for playing time. “Heidi has the potential to be the best middle blocker on the team,” predicts Grant,

“while Jeni has been a pleasant surprise. Both are also candidates for the right outside hitter position.”

Laura Bonner (Fr., Kennewick, Wash.) is another potential outside hitter, while Heather Peeples (Jr., Olympia, Wash.), a transfer from Vanguard University, is a leading candidate for the defensive specialist starting spot. Tausha Doramus (Fr., Greenleaf, Idaho) will spell Yost at setter. Two other players from the junior varsity program, Sara Sendele (So., Weiser, Idaho) and Angie Frank (So., Lebanon, Ore.) will provide depth as outside hitters / defensive specialists.

Summary

“The key to our success this year will be if we can learn to play wisely on the offensive end,” Grant says. “We will be scrappy and defense-oriented, badgering our opponents by digging and keeping the ball in play, and I expect us to improve throughout the season as our hitters grow more confident.”



Background on the Bruin Nickname

George Fox’s Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887, just two years after Pacific Academy (the University’s predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.

When it grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. After the bear escaped one too many times, it was turned into steak for the dining table, and the hide was preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the bearskin deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling so the pelt was left standing in a corner.

Students later found the old Bruin skin and began skirmishes over its ownership, a tradition that continues today. “Bruin Junior,” a replica hide, is fought over periodically in class competitions, under a set of guidelines passed down for years. The class that is able to drag the Bruin replica physically off campus is declared the rightful owner until the bearskin is next “flashed.”

Despite the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, because of the University’s church affiliation, the “Quaker” tag for athletic teams became popular with sportswriters. The Quaker nickname was used for years, along with the mascot “Foxy George,” a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

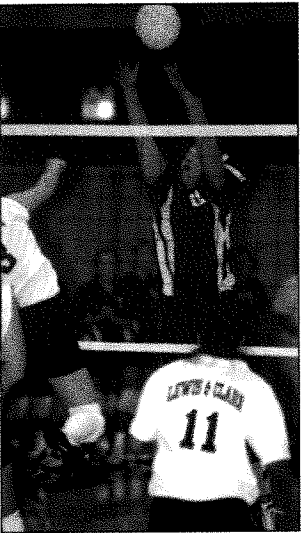

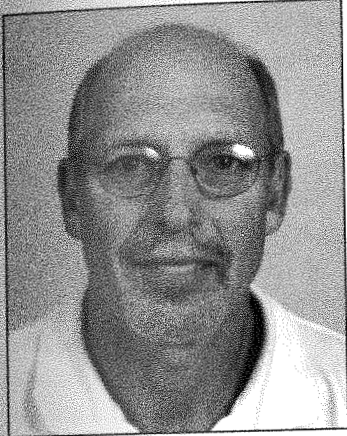

Coaches

Steve Grant
Head Coach

Steve Grant, whose tenure at George Fox University is the longest of any current coach, begins his 19th season with the Bruins' volleyball team, having established the program as one of the most consistent winners in the nation.



Over the past 18 years, the Bruins have ended the season on the winning side of the ledger 16 times. Last year's 19-7 mark was the 13th straight winning season for the Bruins, and only a season-ending five-set loss to Pacific Lutheran prevented the team from advancing to the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III play-offs in their first year of NCAA eligibility.

Grant's teams have previously made their mark in postseason play, however. While a member of the National Christian College Athletic Association, George Fox won NCCAA national championships in 1984 (30-10) and 1987 (33-22), and each time Grant was named NCCAA National

Coach of the Year. During the years when George Fox was also a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, Grant was twice named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year (1984 and 1990) for leading the Bruins to outstanding seasons.

In 1998, while a dual member of the NAIA and the NCAA, the Bruins went 31-8, won the Northwest Conference regular season and tournament crowns for the first time, and reached the NAIA National Tournament in Kankakee, Illinois, for the only time in team history. Grant was named NWC Coach of the Year for that success.

Grant's very first team captured its only Women's Conference of Independent Colleges championship in 1982 (17-14).

With a career record of 424-251 (.630), all at George Fox, Grant ranks 16th on the list for victories among active NCAA Division III coaches, and 24th on the all-time list of Division III coaches.

During the 1990s, five of his athletes won NAIA All-American awards, and five were named NAIA All-American Scholar-Athletes. Last year, seniors Sharon Barnett and Beth Davis were named to the AVCA/NCAA All-West Region Team, and Davis was a GTE Academic All-America District VIII (West Region) selection.

In addition to his volleyball duties, Grant served as a men's assistant basketball coach at George Fox until 1995, and he currently teaches as an associate professor in the health and human performance department.

Grant is a 1969 graduate of Biola University, where he was a three-sport athlete. As a guard for the basketball team, he was named team MVP both his junior and senior years. He earned First Team All-Conference, All-District, and All-Far West honors as an Eagles' defender on the soccer team, and played baseball his freshman and junior years. He remained at his alma mater upon graduation for two years as an assistant basketball and soccer coach.

In 1971, Grant moved to Salem, Ore., to become boys' basketball coach and head baseball coach at Salem Academy. In 1975, he switched from baseball to volleyball.

From 1981-82, Grant coached the women's basketball team and was the men's soccer coach at Western Baptist College in Salem.

Grant, who also earned a master's degree in education from Linfield College in 1985, lives in Newberg with his wife, Kathy, an admissions counselor for the continuing education department at George Fox. They have two children, Jeff, 28, and Bryan, 25.

She was a volunteer assistant with the CVA volleyball team and took the spring club team to the Davis Festival, a large club-team volleyball tournament held at the University of California-Davis.

At George Fox, Guyer will also serve as an adjunct professor in the department of health and human performance. She is single and resides in Newberg.

Athletic Director

Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his 13th year as George Fox University athletic director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for a total of 27 years as a player, coach, and professor.

Taylor, 49, first came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, receiving honors as the Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1976-79, Taylor was the Bruins' baseball coach while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He worked at a sporting goods retailing firm from 1979-81, but returned to George Fox as coach of the women's basketball team from 1981-93, producing a 162-155 record. He also coached the softball team from 1981-88 and again in 1990, compiling a 77-99-1 record. In 1985, he was named NAIA District 2 Softball Coach of the Year.

At George Fox, Taylor is responsible for athletic department functions, including budgeting, department and sports center management, and eligibility and compliance with George Fox, Northwest Conference, and NCAA regulations. In 1992, he was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the Year.

Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville and have three children: Leah, 26; Bree, 21, who plays volleyball for the Bruins; and Casey, 11.



Associate Athletic Director

Pat Bailey

In addition to being George Fox's award-winning baseball coach, Pat Bailey serves as associate athletic direc-

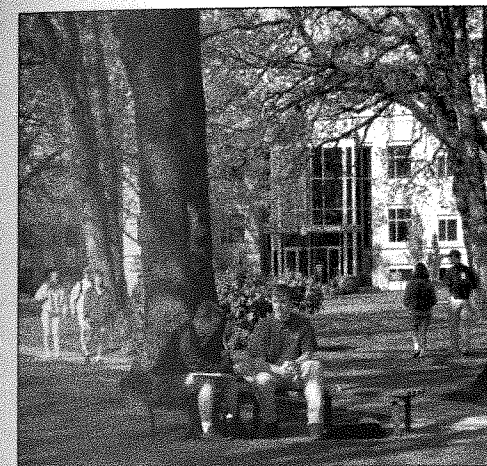

University

The University

George Fox University, an evangelical Christian liberal arts college, is expanding, both in size and reputation. One of the fastest-growing institutions of higher learning in the United States, George Fox has seen its enrollment more than quadruple in the past 14 years, increasing from 549 in 1986 to 2,636 students in the fall of 2000.

Since 1986, George Fox University has been named one of "America's Best Colleges" 12 times by U.S. News & World



Report. In 1999, George Fox ranked second overall and third in academic reputation among Western regional liberal arts colleges. The magazine also named the University one of the region's

best values among schools in its category.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, in which the University pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.

The school's history began in 1885 when Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy. It was during those early days that George Fox's most prominent alumnus attended the school — Herbert Hoover, who later became the 30th president of the United States.

The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction and the name became Pacific College. In 1949, because of the many schools in the West with "Pacific" in their title, another change was made, this time to George Fox College, honoring the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of 35 undergraduate majors and nine graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox is located in Newberg, Oregon (pop. 17,355), 25 miles southwest of Portland, the state's largest metropolitan center of 1.7 million, and 32 miles northwest of Salem, the state capital.

Dr. David Brandt
University President

David Brandt, George Fox University's 11th president, came to the university in August 1998 after three years as president of Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kan.

Brandt has international experience, traveling annually to Daystar University in Nairobi, Kenya, an institution he helped organize and for which he continues to serve on the United States board.

Brandt has experience at four other Christian colleges and describes himself as "a 'lifer' in Christian higher education." He has been vice president and provost at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn.; dean and vice president for academic affairs at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.; a physics instructor and chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Gordon College in Wenham, Mass.; and a physics instructor at Wheaton (Ill.) College.

Brandt did his undergraduate work in physics at Wheaton. He earned a master of science degree in physics in 1962 from the University of Oklahoma, and a doctorate in physics in 1971 from the same university.

Brandt also taught physics in 1962-63 at the University of Omaha in Nebraska; was a demonstrator in physics at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ont., Canada in 1968-69; was a part-time engineer at Raytheon Co. in Sudbury, Mass., between 1972 and 1974; and was a consulting engineer for International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. in Roanoke, Va. between 1975 and 1977. His research there on fiber optics resulted in two patent applications.



Wheeler Center: A Natural Place For Sports

Entered by crossing a wooded canyon on a 200-foot bridge, the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education, home of the George Fox Bruins' volleyball and men's and women's basketball teams, is a natural place to play sports of all sorts.

The sports center was designed by noted architect Pietro Belluschi to sit unpretentiously alongside tree-shaded Hess Creek Canyon. Built using gifts from prominent lumbermen, the building features a two-level oak parquet lobby and a large window area overlooking the adjacent natural terrain. Completed in June 1977, the \$2.7 million, 55,000-square-foot complex is the University's largest building. It contains the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium, the Bruins' home court, with a total seating capacity of 2,750.

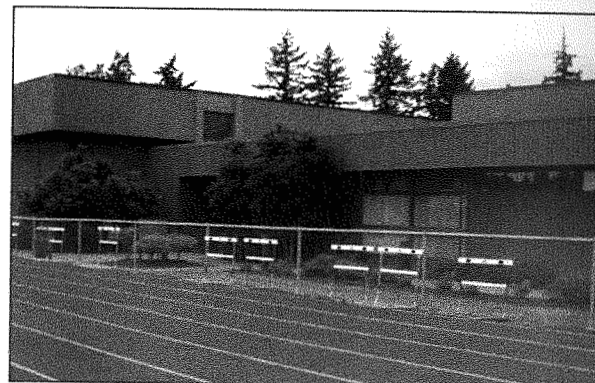
Wheeler Center features a 116x174-foot gymnasium with three full-length basketball courts, three volleyball courts, and 10 badminton courts. The ceilings are 32 feet above the maple hardwood floor.

The building may be entered on two levels. The east-side ground level is accessible from the parking lot by crossing the foot bridge. The on-campus community enters on the west-side second floor.

Contained on the upper level are a staff room, multipurpose room, classrooms, and athletic administration and faculty offices. The 1,500-square-foot weight room was remodeled in the summer of 1993. The lower level contains a concession

area, dressing rooms, team rooms, laundry, equipment-issuing room, and storage space. An east wing of the building houses two racquetball courts.

The building is named for longtime Oregon lumberman Coleman H. Wheeler, former chairman of the board of Willamette Industries. The gymnasium is named for former George Fox board member James Miller and his wife, Lila. Miller is the former president of Cascadia Lumber Co.



Individual Honors Abound, But Playoffs Elude Bruins' Grasp

One player does not a team make, but a significant injury to a key player at the wrong time may well have been the determining factor in the George Fox University volleyball fortunes in 1999.

Bruins Barely Miss on Playoff Spot

The Bruins compiled the fourth-best winning percentage in team history (.731) with their 19-7 record, and tied for second in the Northwest Conference at 12-4, but the team did not receive a hoped-for bid to the NCAA Division III Tournament in its first year of NCAA eligibility. A mid-season injury to outside hitter Sharon Barnett may have been the crippling blow.

A season-opening 8-1 run, with a loss to #2 nationally ranked California-San Diego the only blemish, gave the Bruins high hopes for a shot at postseason play. But Barnett, the Co-Conference Player of the Year in 1998, twisted an ankle in the ninth game, against Whitman, and missed the next four games.

Without their acknowledged spark-plug in the game, the Bruins dropped three in a row, two to NWC rivals Linfield and Willamette sandwiched around a thrilling five-set loss at home to #14-ranked Colorado College.

After Barnett returned to the lineup, the Bruins won 10 of their next 12 games to forge a tie for first in the conference with Pacific Lutheran with one game to play — a home match against PLU. The Bruins took a 2-1 lead in the contest before some 1,000 fans at the Wheeler Sports Center, but could not put PLU away and dropped the last two games of the match, surrendering their 1998 conference crown to the Lutes,

who became the only Northwest Conference team selected for the playoffs.

Individual, Team Accomplishments Are Many

Though the season ended on a disappointing note, there was still much to be proud of. It was the Bruins' 13th-straight winning season, and they finished second in two prestigious tournaments, the Puget Sound Tournament and the UC-Santa Cruz Tournament, losing in each only to nationally-ranked teams UCSD and #13 California State-Hayward.

Sharon Barnett repeated as NWC Player of the Year, leading the conference and ranking 24th nationally in kills-per-game (4.21), the second-highest average in team history to Joanna Lofgren's 5.60 in 1995. Her digs-per-game average of 3.58 was the eighth-best single season mark ever, and she finished her four-year career as the all-time Bruin leader in kills (1,449) and digs (1,641).

Senior middle blocker Beth Davis led the conference in blocks-per-game (1.39), ranked ninth nationally, and posted the ninth-best single season average for a Bruin. She received First Team All-Conference and GTE Academic All-District VIII honors, and ended her four-year career seventh on the all-time list in kills (1,123).

Both Barnett and Davis were named to the NCAA Division III All-West Region Team.

Senior middle blocker Wendy Clark

made Second Team All-Conference and ranked 16th nationally in blocks-per-

game (1.27). Freshman Mindi Yost, who split setting duties with senior Tristan Nicholas, averaged 11.45 assists-per-game, a figure that would have

led the NWC and ranked 20th nationally had she played enough games to qualify.

Individual team honors were awarded to Sharon Barnett as MVP, senior Stacie Wilton as Best Defensive Player, Wendy Clark as Most Inspirational, and junior Bree Stairs as Most Improved.

As a team, the Bruins finished third in the nation in blocks-per-game (2.96) and 15th in kills-per-game (14.30).

Coach Steve Grant added to his nationally ranked wins total while boosting his 18-year record to 424-251 (.630). He now stands 16th on the active list and 24th on the all-time list for victories by a Division III coach.

Bruins Ranked 10th Nationally in Attendance

Bruin fans also had a big year, supporting the team well enough to lead the conference and rank 10th in the nation in average attendance at the Division III level. The Bruins drew 2,740 fans for 10 home dates for an average of 274 per game, with a high of 1,000 for the season-ending showdown with PLU.

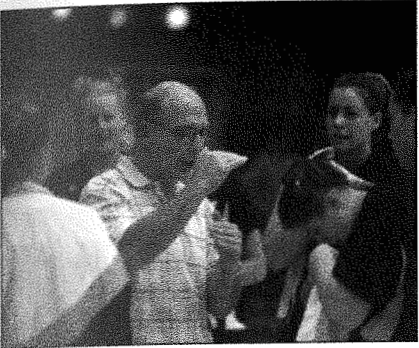

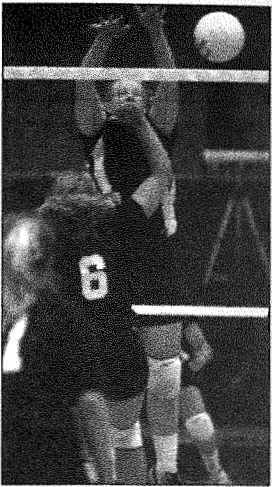

George Fox University Bruin Athletics

Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, however, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics: George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which need and academic ability, not athleticism, determine scholarships and financial aid.

At George Fox University, intercollegiate athletic competition provides a practical application of what is learned in classrooms and practices. Student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body and spirit. The values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes

- physical conditioning
- managing emotions
- courage
- teamwork
- cooperation
- being gracious in winning and losing

More than 15 percent of George Fox's undergraduate students participate in the school's 13 varsity sports, seven for women and six for men. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition.

Consider that:

- George Fox has earned district or conference titles in nine sports during the 1990s.

- George Fox athletes have earned more than 250 All-American and All-American Scholar-Athlete honors.
- Nine of the 11 coaches on staff have been named district or conference Coach of the Year at least once.
- George Fox coaches have held their positions for an average of nearly eight years, and together have accumulated more than 1,000 collegiate wins.
