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ABOUT GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the college was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. The college is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises more than 8,300 members in 56 churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

Today the 60-acre rural, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland is undergoing a major expansion with four new buildings completed last year, including a new \$2.4 million sports complex, an \$800,000 academic building, and two new residence halls in a \$1.25 million project. A new \$1.3 million fine arts/ religion center was opened in the fall of 1978, a new television production studio building is under construction to open in 1979, and a new athletic field complex, including baseball field, two softball fields, hockey field and archery range is being readied, to open in the fall of 1979. Enrollment is at a record 715. The college has grown 50 percent in five years.

Accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the college offers 20 majors in six divisions: Education, Fine and Applied Arts, Language Arts, Natural Science, Religion, and Social Science. George Fox is one of 14 members of the national Christian College Consortium. The college has a student-faculty ratio of 16/1, with nearly 60 percent of faculty members having doctorates.

George Fox students come from 23 states and 5 foreign countries. Nearly 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The college's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.

GFC ATHLETICS

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the college in baseball, basketball, track, soccer, and cross-country.

George Fox College competes as an independent on the varsity level. Its schedules are coordinated with both the Evergreen Conference and the Northwest Conference and with other independents in the Northwest. George Fox is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), District 2.

Women students compete in field hockey, volleyball, cross-country, basketball, tennis, track, and softball. The college is a member of the Women's Conference of Independent Colleges and the Northwest College Women's Sports Association.

For students not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, softball, and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the new Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field, which includes a football/soccer field and track; and tennis courts. A new athletic field complex containing baseball diamond, two softball fields, hockey field, and archery range is under construction, to be completed by the fall of 1979.

Wheeler Center, completed in 1977 in a \$2.4 million project, includes the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for up to 2,700; multipurpose, class, and weight rooms; faculty and administrative offices; handball courts; dressing and therapy rooms, and saunas.

THE BRUIN NICKNAME

George Fox College is represented by the nickname and mascot "Bruin." But it's not always been so, even though it should have been.

The nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the college's predecessor) was established. The small cub was captured in the coast range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member. When it grew to adulthood it was kept in a pit in what is now known as Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When it deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling, so it was left sitting in a corner. Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continued 85 years later. "Bruin Junior," under a set of guidelines passed down for years, was fought over periodically in class competition with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag to athletic teams came into popularity with sports-writers because of the college's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with a mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students, and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

BRUINS COMPETE IN NAIA DISTRICT 2

George Fox College men's athletic teams compete in District 2 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Fifteen teams currently make up the district, all but four within the state of Oregon. They include the four members of the Northwest Conference, four members of the Evergreen Conference, and seven independent schools, including George Fox.

The district tip-off and play-off guidelines are established by a basketball committee, composed of the 15 coaches, last year with Bruin Coach Sam Willard as chairman. The play-off system this year involves an eight-team tournament including the colleges rated highest by the "Sempert System," which awards points based on wins and losses against teams with winning and losing records.

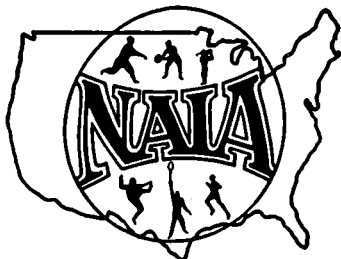
The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics was officially formed in 1952, the outgrowth of the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball, which had been organized in 1937, primarily to determine a national champion in basketball. The purpose of the NAIA is "to champion the cause and promote the interests of the colleges of moderate enrollment and sound athletic philosophy and program." NAIA now sponsors 15 national champions for the 513 member institutions in 31 districts in the United States and Canada. The national headquarters is at 1205 Baltimore, Kansas City, MO 64105.

Members of NAIA District 2 are Brigham Young—Hawaii, College of Idaho, Eastern Oregon State, George Fox, Lewis and Clark, Linfield, Northwest Nazarene, Oregon College of Education, Oregon Institute of Technology, Pacific, Southern Oregon, University of Hawaii—Hilo, Warner Pacific, Western Baptist, and Willamette.

George Fox College has been in the NAIA District 2 playoffs seven of the last eight years, missing only in the 1975-76 season when the Bruins did not participate, even though they had the best record in the district (19-8), because of then-existing play-off regulations that have since been altered.

THIS IS WHERE THE GAME IS PLAYED



George Fox College begins its second year in the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education. Completed in June, 1977, the \$2.4 million, 51,000-square-foot complex is the college's largest building. It contains the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium, the Bruin home court.

The sports center was designed by noted architect Pietro Belluschi, with a wooded canyon setting chosen as the center's location. The building features wood products and a large window area overlooking the adjacent natural terrain.

Nearly three times larger than Hester Gymnasium, which it replaced, the Wheeler Center features a 116 x 174 foot gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for 2,700 spectators. The gymnasium ceilings are 32 feet over the hardwood maple floor. The gym provides three volleyball courts and five badminton courts.

The building is entered on two levels—ground level on the east side through nine doors for the general public and after crossing a 200-foot bridge; and on the second floor on the west side for campus personnel. There is a two-floor lobby featuring oak parquet floors.

Contained on the upper level are athletic administration and faculty offices, staff room, and class, weight, and multipurpose rooms plus an open concrete deck for further recreation and instruction space.

The lower level contains a concession area and ticket sales area, dressing rooms, team rooms, laundry, equipment-issuing room, and storage space. An east wing of the building houses two handball courts.

The building is named for long-time Oregon lumberman Coleman H. Wheeler, former chairman of the board of Willamette Industries. The gymnasium is named for board member James Miller and his wife Lila. He is the former president of Cascadia Lumber Co. The building was dedicated Oct. 17, 1977.

A LOOK AT THE PAST

The game of basketball was invented by Dr. James Naismith in 1891, and it took just seven years for it to be brought to George Fox College (then called Pacific College).

College board member and community leader T. W. Hester and others first saw the game played at the Portland YMCA. They were captivated by the new game and secured a ball, which they brought back to the college. The first exhibition game was played shortly thereafter, in the winter of 1898, and the first site was the third floor of the old Commercial Hotel on North Main Street because the college had no adequate space for the new sport.

The first gymnasium on the campus was the upper part of one wing of an old academy building (*Hoover Hall*), built in 1885 and torn down in the mid 1950s. A one-room wood gymnasium building was constructed in 1916 and served until 1946, when the college opened Hester Gymnasium, a concrete block structure built partly by student/faculty labor at a cost of \$40,000. The building, with a single hemlock playing floor and seating for 1,100, served through the 1976-77 season with opening of Wheeler Center.

College athletic affiliation in men's basketball over those years has gone from independent status to membership in the old Willamette Christian College Conference, the Metropolitan Conference, the Oregon Collegiate Conference, and back again to the present status as a major small college independent member of NAIA District 2 (joined in 1965). In 1973 George Fox was the district champion and has been in the district playoffs seven of the last eight years.

"Our greatest basketball year," according to a college publication, "*The First Fifty Years*" (published in 1941), "was reached in 1917 when Pacific College won the [Willamette Valley] league championship and defeated Oregon State College 34-25." There have, of course, been many significant wins, seasons, and players throughout the last 79 years. Much of that history, however, has been lost because of the lack of available information and incomplete records prior to NAIA membership in 1965. Highlights and records since that time appear on the following pages. Pre-NAIA statistics available show these marks: Bill Hopper with a 42-point game and 17 field goals, March 2, 1956, against the Greenleaf, Idaho, Town Team, and Cub Grimm in 1952-53 season with a 21.0 game average, and 26 free throws in a contest with the Oregon Medical School in 1953.



1977-78 HIGHLIGHTS

The 1977-78 basketball season might be a pivotal one—at least on paper. It may be the dividing line by which things are now dated as “A.C.” or “After Cozens.” It was a year dominated by super center Paul Cozens, who became the college's most honored player ever.

The 6-6 standout was named to the NAIA national second team and was a ninth round NBA draft pick by the Portland Trail Blazers. A four-year player for the Bruins, Cozens also received the college's highest honor: for the first time a basketball uniform was retired, as No. 44 went up in the trophy case in recognition of Cozens' 25 school records, 13 of them set during the season.

Cozens left behind four single-game bests, nine season marks and 12 career records, as he led NAIA District 2 in both scoring (23.9) and rebounding (12.8) and was tops in free throw accuracy with .905 at the line. Nationally he was the only player in the final NAIA rankings to be listed in both scoring (16th) and rebounding (15th). He was third in the nation in free throw accuracy. His complete statistics are on pages 19-20.

For the Bruins, as a whole, it was their first in the new sports playpen, the Coleman H. Wheeler Sports Center with the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium. And it was a successful start with 10 wins in 13 home contests, as the college hosted the district Tip-off for the first time. The Bruins, however, were 6-10 on the road to finish with a 16-13 overall record that was reduced in midseason to 15-14 following a forfeit to Western Baptist for using an ineligible player.

For the seventh time in eight years the Bruins reached the District 2 playoffs, and almost per script, lost to Oregon Tech (79-65). George Fox has never won an NAIA contest in Klamath Falls in eight years and three times (1974, '75, '78) has lost district playoff contests at OIT.

For the season the Bruins won 14 of 22 games with District 2 opponents and were 2 of 5 out of the district, including three games with NCAA schools. The season went into the books with a first there, however, as the Bruins produced their first-ever win over an NCAA school, tripping Seattle Pacific 80-75.

The 1977-78 team set a new team single-game field goal mark on February 10 with a 64.6 percentage against Northwest Nazarene. New team season records included the most free throws made (524) and the most free throws attempted (723).

For the first time in recent years, the Bruins were outscored—barely—by opponents. Averaging 83.0 points a game, the Bruins allowed foes 83.4. GFC had the rebounding advantage, however, on top 40.3 to 39.9. The season saw more “century games” than ever with four final scores topping the 100-mark. Complete season statistics are on page 18.

HOW IT LOOKS FOR 1978-79

To maintain a positive outlook following the loss (via graduation) of a national All-American might be difficult for some coaches. But don't include George Fox Coach Sam Willard among them.

"I'm looking for a good year," says Willard as he begins his third season with the Bruins. "We'll be a good ball club."

He qualifies that a little, however. "How well we'll do will depend on the freshmen coming along; they'll have to prove themselves and get totally involved."

The Bruins will be rebuilding after the loss of "Mr. Everything," Paul Cozens, an NAIA second team pick nationally, a four-year All-District 2 first team selection, and a ninth round NBA draft pick by the Portland Trail Blazers. Cozens leaves behind 25 school records—as well as a big gap to be filled.

There has been no direct replacement and Willard plans "a new look offense." "It will lend to the mobility of the players we now have and will enhance their abilities," he says.

"I'm extremely pleased with our returners this year and with a good freshman group—as good as any we've had."

Heading that list of returners is senior forward Dave Adrian, one of the college's all-time, all-around best players. He's already third in all-time scoring (1,124 points), eighth in rebounding and fourth in assists and should finish first in assists and second in scoring, right behind Cozens who has been gaining the attention while Adrian was averaging an also spectacular 17 points a game last season and following Cozens in rebounding at 5.2 a game.

Also back are five others, including senior guards Gregg Griffin and Gary Chenault, who could finish in the top five in all-time scoring and well up the line in assists. Also on hand is returning senior forward Charles Upchurch, whose consistency could make a major difference for this year's team. Returning sophomore lettermen are Phil Barnhart, who gained a starting role in several games last year, and Darcy Weisner.

And there are some fine newcomers in the fold, including two junior transfers and four freshmen, all off league championship squads with state tourney appearances.

"I'm pleased with the intensity shown by our returners," Willard says. "I look for a closer-knit team than before." And, he adds, "We have some very gifted, blue-blooded newcomers who will definitely help."

"I'm pleased with what I'm seeing," Willard says. "We have everything going for us, especially spiritually. I sense excitement in stressing that Christ is THE center of our team; we'll always keep that in mind."

COACH SAM WILLARD

Sam J. Willard is in his third season at the George Fox basketball helm. And it's been a winning first two years. In his first year Willard took the Bruins to a 20-9 record, the best ever in the school's history and the first time a 20-win season had been reached. And last season the Bruins posted a 15-14 record (16-13 on the court, but one game forfeited with an ineligible player). Both seasons under Willard the Bruins have been in the NAIA District 2 playoffs.



The new Willard era began May 15, 1977, as he was named head basketball coach and athletic director to replace Lorin Miller. He officially began those duties three months later. The dual role is not unfamiliar to Willard: he held similar duties at Big Bend Community College in Moses Lake, Wash., for seven years before being chosen for the George Fox positions.

Willard's selection in itself is a measure of his qualities: he was the top choice for the post after a screening committee considered dozens of candidates from across the nation. Maintaining a winning tradition was a strong factor, but equally important were the personal attributes and characteristics reflecting the George Fox objectives.

Coaching has been Willard's background for the last 17 years. It's been impressive with an overall coaching record of 310 wins and 184 losses. In 1966 the Bruin mentor was Coach of the Year on the prep level in Idaho while he coached at Caldwell High. Willard guided basketball at Middleton from 1960 through 1965, then spent four years, until 1969, at Caldwell. His teams were in the state tournaments seven of those nine years, placing at least third each year. He coached his team to the state championship title twice, one year with an undefeated 27-0 mark.

Willard, 43 (June 4, 1935), has his own personal basketball mark, too. A graduate of Northwest Nazarene College in 1959 Willard, in a guard slot, helped the Crusaders to the NAIA national championship playoffs in 1957. A "preacher's kid," Willard played high school ball in Williston, North Dakota, where he was an All-State guard.

With a real concern for the individual as a person as well as a player, Willard, basically a quiet person, says he has only "total excitement and optimism" about the Bruin program.

Academically, Willard holds a master's degree from Central Washington State following summer sessions at Oregon State and Arizona State. That knowledge is used now as an associate professor of physical education on the GFC faculty. For five summers Willard was assistant director and athletic director for a Youth Conservation Camp in Moses Lake.

Willard has coached summer basketball camps and clinics in Washington, Oregon, and California. He has his own Mt. Shasta Camp in Northern California and assisted last summer with Portland Trail Blazer Coach Jack Ramsay's summer camps held on the George Fox campus.

Willard is an active Kiwanian and a member of the Nazarene Church. He and his wife Myrna, a Newberg kindergarten teacher, have four children: Sherelyn, 15, Samantha, 12, Buntly, 11, and Whitney, 10.

ASST. COACH CRAIG TAYLOR

Craig Taylor is in his eighth year under Coach Sam Willard, serving in a variety of situations. Taylor, 27, (June 16, 1951), played basketball for five years with Willard as his coach: three years at Caldwell High School in Idaho, then following him to Big Bend Community College for another two years. Now they're together again for a third year with Taylor as the chief assistant for the Bruin effort.



A 1974 George Fox graduate, earning both Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding PE Major honors, Taylor is a member of the physical education staff with assignments as instructor of volleyball, bowling, and water sports, as Bruin baseball boss (10-18 last spring), as intramural director and sports center building coordinator. For two seasons Taylor served as a graduate assistant to previous basketball coach Lorin Miller, then in 1976 was named by Willard as the chief assistant.

Taylor was a member and captain of GFC's national-contending 1972-73 basketball squad in the NAIA championship tournament. For the Bruins he averaged 10 points a game, among the best among all-time Bruin NAIA scores. He averaged 4.96 rebounds a game on his way to both district tip-off and all-district honors as a senior.

Under Willard at Big Bend Taylor, a 6-6 forward, was the leading scorer and rebounder for two years, earning honors as team captain and an All-Northwest Community College League pick. He was an All-Conference and All-State basketball star in Idaho under Willard.

Taylor completed a master's degree in education in 1976, and two years ago was named to Outstanding Young Men of America. He and his wife Cheryl have a daughter Leah, 4.
