Letter from the President

FOR THE LOVE OF THE GAME

What do you think of when you hear the phrase “intercollegiate athletics”? Most often what comes to mind is NCAA Division I football, March Madness, millions of dollars, and perhaps even scandals. More than 1,000 universities participate in NCAA athletics, but public attention usually focuses on 50 institutions in five conferences.

At George Fox, we are members of NCAA Division III, a group of more than 400 schools who view athletics as an extension of the classroom – a venue where many of life’s most valuable lessons are learned. It’s in athletic competition that students learn to overcome adversity, to understand what it means to be part of a team, and to sacrifice one’s own personal goals for the betterment of the group. Leadership principles are tried and tested.

We believe in maintaining a proper perspective between academics and athletics. Character, work ethic, sportsmanship and teamwork take precedence over winning. It’s a commitment that reflects our philosophy that the athletic arena is more than just a place where games are played – it’s an outlet vitally critical to the leadership development, mentoring and education of young people.

I love how our football coach, Chris Casey, puts it: “Athletics are not ‘extracurricular,’ they’re ‘co-curricular.’” The athletic experience strengthens the academic experience, and it is one of the reasons why sports have always been a part of the university program.

It is important to remember that, at George Fox University, our athletes are all becoming professionals in something other than sport. In NCAA D-III our athletes receive scholarships and financial aid only for need and academic ability – not athleticism.

FOOTBALL FACILITIES

Stoffer Family Stadium



The George Fox University Bruins have led the Northwest Conference and ranked nationally in football attendance since the program was reinstated in 2014.

A combined \$1.2 million lead gift from Brad and Katharine Stoffer and their Boedecker Foundation in 2009 provided the seed money for a project that would ultimately allow George Fox to bring football back after a 45-year hiatus from the sport. That project – Stoffer Family Stadium – now stands as a testament to the university’s commitment to provide student-athletes the “most formative athletic experience in the country.”

Groundbreaking for the complex – which includes the synthetic-turf Lemmons Family Field, seating for nearly 3,000 fans and the

Duke Athletic Center – took place in the spring of 2013. Work on the grounds was completed during the summer of 2014, when grandstands were erected, the field was installed and a state-of-the-art video board – arguably the most impressive of its kind in the Northwest Conference – was constructed. Lemmons Field was funded by a generous personal donation by John and Joan Lemmons, founders of Pacific Fibre Products, and Larry Lemmons, the company’s president.

Duke Athletic Center

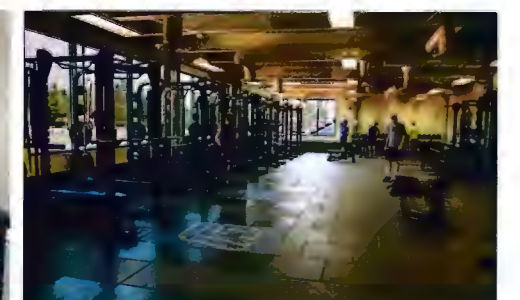
This 14,000-square-foot, two-story facility – located next to Stoffer Family Stadium – includes coaches’ offices, a locker room, an athletic training room, a classroom and a terrace.

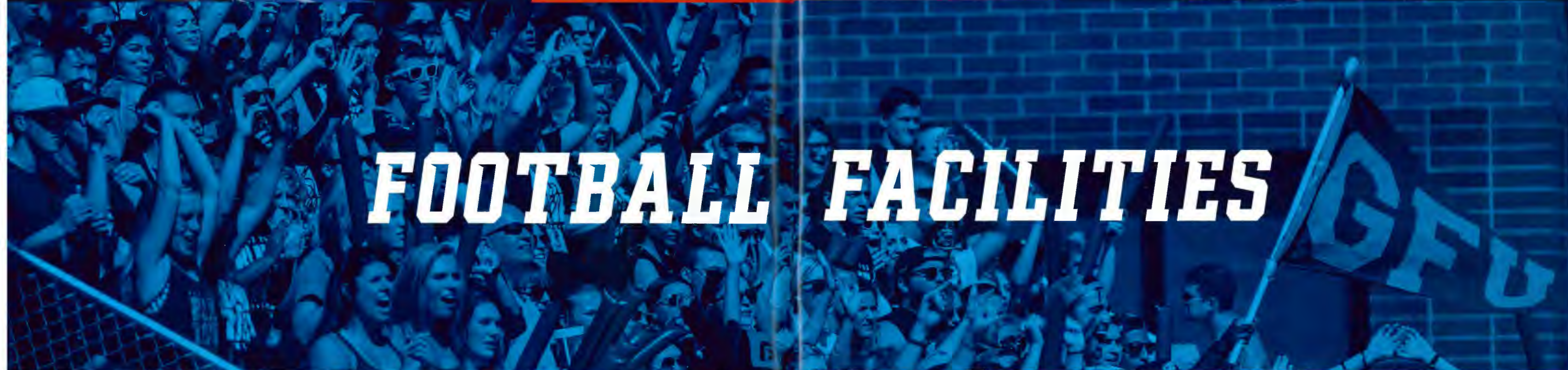
The center is home to the Bruins football team. The football team makes use of 130 custom-made wooden lockers, and all George Fox athletic programs use the facility’s state-of-the-art

weight training room.

Duke’s terrace overlooking the field serves as VIP seating for members of the university’s Terrace Club, allowing for a bird’s-eye view of the action.

The Duke building was made possible by a \$2.5 million donation by philanthropists Marilyn and John Duke in 2011.





At George Fox University, student-athletes pursue conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where athletic competition hinges on what is learned in classrooms and practices. George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in the Division III level of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).



Vision: To be “the team to beat” in NCAA Div. III sports with the most formative athletic experience in the country.

George Fox has earned 30 conference titles, two national team championships, and five individual national championships during the last decade.

Mission: To provide a competitive experience that breeds athletic excellence, academic success and Christ-like character.

More than 15 percent of George Fox’s traditional undergraduate students participate in these sports.

George Fox athletes have earned more than 350 All-America and All-America Scholar-Athlete honors.

Seven coaches currently on staff have been named conference Coach of the Year and three have been national Coach of the Year at least once.

COACHING STAFF



Chris Casey Head Coach (2013-)



Chris Casey is a winner who demands excellence from his players, his coaching staff and himself. His success on the gridiron proves his approach is a winning one.

After winning a state championship at Aloha High School, Casey took the reins of the newly instated football program at George Fox University in 2014 and quickly returned results. In just the second season the team earned four wins, national recognition, and solidified the successful return of the sport to the school after a 45-year hiatus.

In the two years Casey has led the program, nine players have received All-Northwest Conference honors and two players have been named to the D3football.com National Team of the Week.

“The fan-support is tremendous,” said Casey. “Our players and coaches speak often about how much our crowd energizes us and that we feel there is a real bond between our players and fans.”

The Bruins have led the conference in attendance in both of its seasons with more than 1,000 season tickets sold in each year, and sellout crowds nearly every game.

Casey was selected from a national pool of candidates and was announced as the Bruins’ new coach in spring of 2012. The move to college head coach marked a homecoming for Casey, who grew up only a block from the George Fox campus in Newberg, Ore. His ties to the community include serving as a ball boy for the Bruin football program in the late 1960s and graduating from Newberg High School in 1976. His younger brother, Pat Casey, later served as head baseball coach at George Fox (1988-94) before taking the top baseball job at Oregon State University. Another brother, Brian, serves as Newberg’s police chief.

Casey guided Aloha to the Oregon High School Class 6A championship in 2010. Before he arrived at the school in 2004, the Warriors had won only 17 games in the previous 14 seasons, and their playoff appearance in 2009 ended a 22-year postseason drought. He completed his run at Aloha with

the 2012 football season.

Previously, Casey served as an assistant football coach, recruiting coordinator and baseball coach at his alma mater, Linfield College (1985-94), and as an assistant football coach and strength/conditioning coach at Whitworth University in Spokane, Wash. (1994-2004). He was also an assistant football, wrestling and baseball coach at The Dalles High School (1982-85).

Casey’s self-described “blue collar” coaching style emphasizes hard work and dedication, total commitment to the team, and embracing opportunity over obligation. He seeks to transform the lives of the student athletes who join his program into men who will live their lives to excellence in all areas -- in their jobs, in their churches and in their families.

“Having been a part of collegiate athletics for 22 years as a player and coach, I’ve experienced the importance of academics and athletics and the roles they play in developing young people,” said Casey.

“I’m thoroughly impressed with (George Fox President) Robin Baker’s commitment to the football program. It’s a tremendous opportunity to be a part of something that has infused enthusiasm on the campus, among our alumni, and in the Newberg community.”

Prior to his coaching career, Casey played football for Linfield from 1978 to 1981. He also played the sport at Mt. Hood Community College (1976-78) and suited up for football, track, basketball and baseball at Newberg High (1972-76).

“Everywhere Chris has gone, the program has risen – he’s a winner,” said George Fox director of athletics Craig Taylor. “In his 10 years at Whitworth, the team went from one of the worst in the conference to a league title. He did the same at Aloha, taking a down-and-out program all the way to a state championship.

“What really impressed us is the fact that he invests in his players and has high expectations of them academically. Coaching is more than just about football to him. He’s a man you’d want your son to be around.”

John Bates Defensive Coordinator (2013-)



John Bates finished his third season as an assistant coach for the Bruins in 2015, serving as the recruiting coordinator and defensive coordinator for the football program.

Bates has an extensive background in coaching, most recently working as Casey’s defensive coordinator at Aloha from 2011-12. Prior to his stint at Aloha, he was the defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln, Neb., from 2004-10. NWU was consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally in multiple defensive statistical categories during his tenure there, peaking at No. 2 in scoring defense in 2008 by allowing only 11.2 points per game.

During 2002-03, he coached at Western Oregon University as the

defensive line coach in the fall and in Europe as the defensive coordinator for the Chrysler Vienna Vikings in the spring.

A 2000 graduate of Whitworth University with a bachelor’s degree in physical education, Bates remained at his alma mater to begin his coaching career as an assistant in 2000-01, primarily coaching linebackers. In 2001, Whitworth won the Northwest Conference crown and made the NCAA Division III playoffs, the Pirates’ first postseason appearance in 25 years. He completed a master of education degree in secondary education from Whitworth in 2006.

Bates and his wife Dana, a health and human performance professor at George Fox who serves as the director of the athletic training education program, reside in Carlton, Ore. They have two children: Ryan, age 10, and Alexandra, age 6.

COACHING STAFF



Ken Ingram *Offensive Coordinator (2013-)*



Ken Ingram finished his third season at George Fox University as an assistant coach to Chris Casey in 2015.

Ingram worked under Casey at Aloha from 2004-08, helping build that program into a strong one that eventually captured the Oregon 6A state championship in 2010. Following that, Ingram won a state 5A championship of his own in 2009 as the head coach of the Hillsboro (Ore.) High team, which he directed through the 2012 season before accepting his new position at George Fox. While at Hillsboro, he was one of the coaches for the annual

Les Schwab Bowl high school all-star game in 2010 and 2011.

Ingram began his coaching career with three stints as an assistant at Linfield College (1988, 1990-91, 1993). He was the offensive line coach at Sul Ross State University from 1994-95 and Millsaps College from 1998-99. He moved to Texas Lutheran University from 1998-2001 to be the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator for two years, defensive coordinator for one year and offensive coordinator his last year.

A graduate of Hillsboro High, Ingram received his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Linfield in 1988. He and his wife Stacy have three children: Isaiah, Shawna Ashley and Ian.

Ian Sanders *Special Teams Coordinator, Linebackers (2013-)*



Ian Sanders completed his third season for the Bruins as an assistant coach to Chris Casey, after both playing for and coaching with him previously.

Sanders, a native of Tigard, Ore., played free safety and corner at Whitworth University from 1996-2000 and earned All-Northwest Conference Second Team honors in 1999, All-NWC First Team selection in 2000 while leading the league in passes defended, and was

an All-Northwest Second Team member.

Sanders joined Coach Casey at Aloha (Ore.) High School from 2005-2012, serving as the special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach for eight years, defensive backs coach for seven, and linebackers coach for one. He position-coached 22 all-league players and three all-state players. He was a part of the Aloha staff which captured the Oregon 6A state championship in 2010.

A graduate of Whitworth with a bachelor of arts in sociology, Sanders and his wife Natalie have two children: Holden, age 12, and Sloan, age 9.

John Tully *Quarterbacks (2015-)*



John Tully finished his first season under head coach Chris Casey in 2015.

After a successful tenure as an assistant coach at the high school ranks in the early '80s, Tully made his first mark at the college level as an assistant at Southern Oregon State College [now Southern Oregon University]. While in Ashland, Tully served as both offensive and defensive coordinator.

After a five-year stint with the Raiders as an assistant, Tully spent his next five years as the head coach at Eureka College in Illinois. Eureka, which had been a longstanding doormat before Tully's hiring, was looking for a coach to take the team out of the depths of its conference. Just two years after his hiring, Tully led Eureka's first undefeated season with the

second-highest rated passing quarterback in the nation, leading the Red Devils to the national playoffs.

Tully took the head coaching job at Whitworth a few years later. The Pirates are now typically at the top of the Northwest Conference, but that wasn't the case before Tully took over. During his time as head coach, Tully took Whitworth to heights it never reached before, including most wins in a season (11 in 2006), three seasons as conference champions, and a national playoff win. Tully's success culminated with his 100th win as head football coach at Whitworth, the most in school history.

Tully is a graduate of Azusa Pacific University with a bachelor's degree in psychology and University of San Diego with a master of education degree. He lives in Newberg with his wife Deborah and sons Jay, Travis and Bo. The family attends St. Thomas More & Life Center.

Gabe Haberly *Wide Receivers, Speed Coach, Video Coordinator (2013-)*



Gabe Haberly finished his third season under head coach Chris Casey in 2015.

He joined the Bruin athletics staff in 2012 as an assistant coach of the men's and women's track and field program under head coach John Smith, working with pole vaulters, javelin throwers and sprinters. He continues in that capacity while also working with football as the wide receivers coach, film coach, and assisting Ken Ingram in the team's strength and conditioning program.

A native of Florence, Ore., and graduate of Siuslaw High School, he earned three letters as a quarterback and defensive back at Linfield College, helping the Wildcats win a Northwest Conference title and

advance to the NCAA Division III quarterfinals in 2005. He also lettered four times in track and field, competing as a decathlete and winning NWC championships in the javelin in 2006 and the pole vault in 2009. He took 13th in the NCAA National Championships in the javelin in 2006 and was a USTFCCA All-Academic honoree in 2006 and 2009. He graduated from Linfield with a BS in mathematics in 2009 and obtained his MS in biomechanics from Oregon State University in 2013.

Haberly remained at his alma mater from 2009-2012 to coach in the football and track programs, with many of his athletes receiving conference and national honors and award.

In addition to his coaching duties at George Fox, Haberly is an adjunct professor in the Department of Health and Human Performance. He is an AXQ-certified athletic trainer as well.

Torey Smith *Running Backs (2013-)*



Torey Smith finished his third season under head coach Chris Casey as an assistant coach after coaching at Newberg (Ore.) High School the prior eight years.

Smith began at Newberg High as a freshman assistant coach and worked his way up to junior varsity head coach and varsity running backs coach. He was also a coach and board member of

Newberg's youth football program.

Originally from Newport News, Va., Smith's family relocated to

Honolulu, Hawai'i, where he played both running back and linebacker for Radford High School. He played at Linfield College, where Chris Casey was the defensive ends coach and Ken Ingram, now an assistant coach for the Bruins, was his teammate.

Smith earned his degree in computer science from Linfield in 1991 and has worked for the last 10 years as a software analyst for Daimler Trucks North America. He and his college sweetheart, Christy, a teacher at Mabel Rush Elementary School in Newberg, have been married for 22 years. The Smiths have three children who are all students at Newberg High: son Evan and twin daughters Alanna and Brenna.

Nic Brockhoff *Defensive Assistant, Defensive Line (2015-)*



Nic Brockhoff completed his first season under head coach Chris Casey during the 2015 football season.

Nic graduated from Whitworth University in 2015, where he earned a degree in kinesiology and a minor in coaching. He played football each of the four years he attended and recorded a total of 168 tackles (10 for loss) in his career. In

2012, he was an all-league inside linebacker for the Pirates, racking up 52 tackles and a pair of interceptions (one of those he returned for a TD).

During his four-year career as a Pirate, he started 34 of 40 games after winning the starting job during his freshman fall camp. He missed only three games in his career due to a cracked rib injury in his junior season and was named a game captain multiple times throughout his junior and senior seasons.

Outside of football Nic is passionate about personal training and athletic development of teens and youth. Living in Spokane between school years, he spent two summers working as the co-strength coach at Ferris HS working with both female and male athletes.

Todd Hicks *Assistant Coach, Wide Receivers/Tight Ends (2014-)*



Todd Hicks finished his second season under head coach Chris Casey, as an assistant coach working with wide receivers and tight ends.

Hicks has an extensive background in coaching football, with more than 20 years of experience in the sport. He has spent time at Sherwood High School, Linfield College, Lewis & Clark College, Vernonia High School, Forest Grove High School

and Liberty High School. Within that career he served as the head coach at Vernonia High School, where he led the team to the playoffs every year and was named Lewis Clark Conference Coach of the Year (2006).

He is married to Adrienne and they have two boys, Justin (15) and Cody (13). They attend Evergreen Christian Center in Hillsboro.

Julian Cruell *Defensive Assistant, Corners (2014-)*

Julian Cruell finished his second season under head coach Chris Casey, as a defensive back coach for the Bruins in 2015. In 2014, Cruell helped with the wide receivers, among other skill positions.

He graduated from Henry Foss High School in Tacoma, Wash., while earning four letters in football. During his time there he was named all-league three seasons as a return man and selected second team all-league at cornerback. In addition to football he lettered in track and basketball.

Cruell spent one season at Central Washington before transferring to Portland State, where he played as a running back and a cornerback. He graduated in 2014 with a bachelor's degree in communication.

Cruell is the son of Waymon and Nora Cruell, has two sisters, Sharday and Sydnee, and one nephew, Christian.

Clancy Hennessy *Offensive Assistant, O-Line/Tight Ends (2014-)*



Clancy Hennessy completed his second season under head coach Chris Casey, working as an offensive assistant and offensive line/tight ends coach.

Hennessy spent his first season working in all areas for the Bruin football program, while primarily working on the defensive side.

Scott Cannon *Kickers (2014-)*

Scott Cannon completed his second season under head coach Chris Casey in the 2015 season.

Before his time at George Fox, Cannon collected 10 years of experience working with kickers and punters at Tigard High School, Linfield College, Aloha High School and Sherwood High School.

He is married to Stacie Cannon and they have a 1-year-old son, Fisher. They attend Athey Creek Christian Church.



The George Fox football team made progress in 2015, posting a 4-6 overall mark and 2-5 record in the Northwest Conference after securing one victory the year before. And, once again, the Bruins led the NWC in attendance for a second straight season while also doubling the number of players selected to the All-NWC list.

In his second year at the helm, head coach Chris Casey was quite pleased with the team's showing.

"The work ethic that our guys put in during the offseason was great," he said. "We had a great recruiting class, and the guys from last year made great strides in getting bigger, faster and stronger every day. This team is one big family, and you can see that with our coach-to-player and player-to-player relationships.

"Overall, our goal is to continue to improve. Last year, we were competitive in every game but two. This year, we were competitive in

every game. We improve as the game goes on. Our goal is to play at a championship level in everything. Our team has embraced that fact. Competitive is not good enough; it is just a progression to get to the championship level."

One of the many bright spots this season was the come-from-behind victory over Redlands on Sept. 12 – a 39-35 victory. At one point during the final drive, the Bruins faced a fourth and nine on their own 16-yard line. Quarterback Grant Schroeder lofted a perfectly placed pass to Derek Richwine, who gave the Bruins new life with a 30-yard gain. George Fox proceeded to march down the field, with a key play being a Schroeder-to-John Shaffer screen pass during which Shaffer shook off two defenders for a 24-yard gain that put the Bruins on the Bulldogs' 11.

With just 30 seconds left, the Bruins continued to give the ball to Shaffer, who chipped away at the Bulldogs' defense. As time ran down and fans started to rise on their feet, Shaffer leaped into the air, scoring the game-winning touchdown.

"Shaffer's screen pass against Redlands was one of the best plays I've ever seen," Casey said. "He refuses to be denied. He was the essence and embodiment of what our team was about."

The fun didn't stop there, as the Bruins earned their revenge against Arizona Christian in a 45-27 win, their largest margin of victory on the season.

The 2015 team showed progress and left fans with high expectations for what is a young, but eager, football team. The squad nearly tripled every statistic from 2014 and graduated a senior class of eight players. In that group, Shaffer, Lenana Meekisho and Jesse Bresser leave as all-time team leaders in their respective categories in the George Fox record book. Meekisho was named to the D3football.com Team of the Week for his efforts against Redlands, as he kicked a program-record

49-yard field goal. He also holds every punting record at George Fox and finished the 2015 season ranked 34th among NCAA Div. III punters. Bresser led the Bruins' defense and is now the all-time leading tackler



at George Fox. Shaffer finished the season as the rushing leader in the Northwest Conference with 88.0 yards per game.

"We are so proud of our guys," Casey said. "Jesse was our leader. He gained people's respect and didn't lose a beat and had a tremendous year. Our lines (offensive and defensive) were great. It was nice to see Nolan Schuler and Tanner Krahel recognized in conference for their efforts. All around we made nice improvements."

Schroeder also had a solid sophomore campaign. Casey credits his improvement to the offensive line, the addition of Coach John Tully and the work that Schroeder put in during the offseason. The quarterback threw for 2,241 yards and 17 touchdowns, virtually doubling his totals from the 2014 season (1,193 yards, eight touchdowns).

"Grant had great improvement, and having Tully in his tutelage in our program for QBs was great," added Casey. "It showed with better

protection what we are capable of."

Receivers Brad Lander and Trevor Daniels benefited from Schroeder's progress, as they accounted for half of his passing yards. Lander received an All-NWC second-team honor and was fifth in the NWC in yards per game (66.1).

"Athletics unifies people," Casey said. "We have felt that with our community and have had great support for the return of George Fox football. You get energized by your fans. Your home crowd helps with the energy of the game. We felt very positive about our relationship [with fans] and are very thankful for the support we have felt thus far."

"Our goal is to play at a championship level and develop young men for adulthood," he added. "We want them more prepared for life while working toward a championship-caliber program. We want to improve



on the little things: warm-ups, film, meetings, and workouts. We want to get better in every aspect. The little things lead to the big things. It's all about the 'Triple A' – 'All About Attitude.' George Fox is a great place, and our football team is adding to it in a special way."

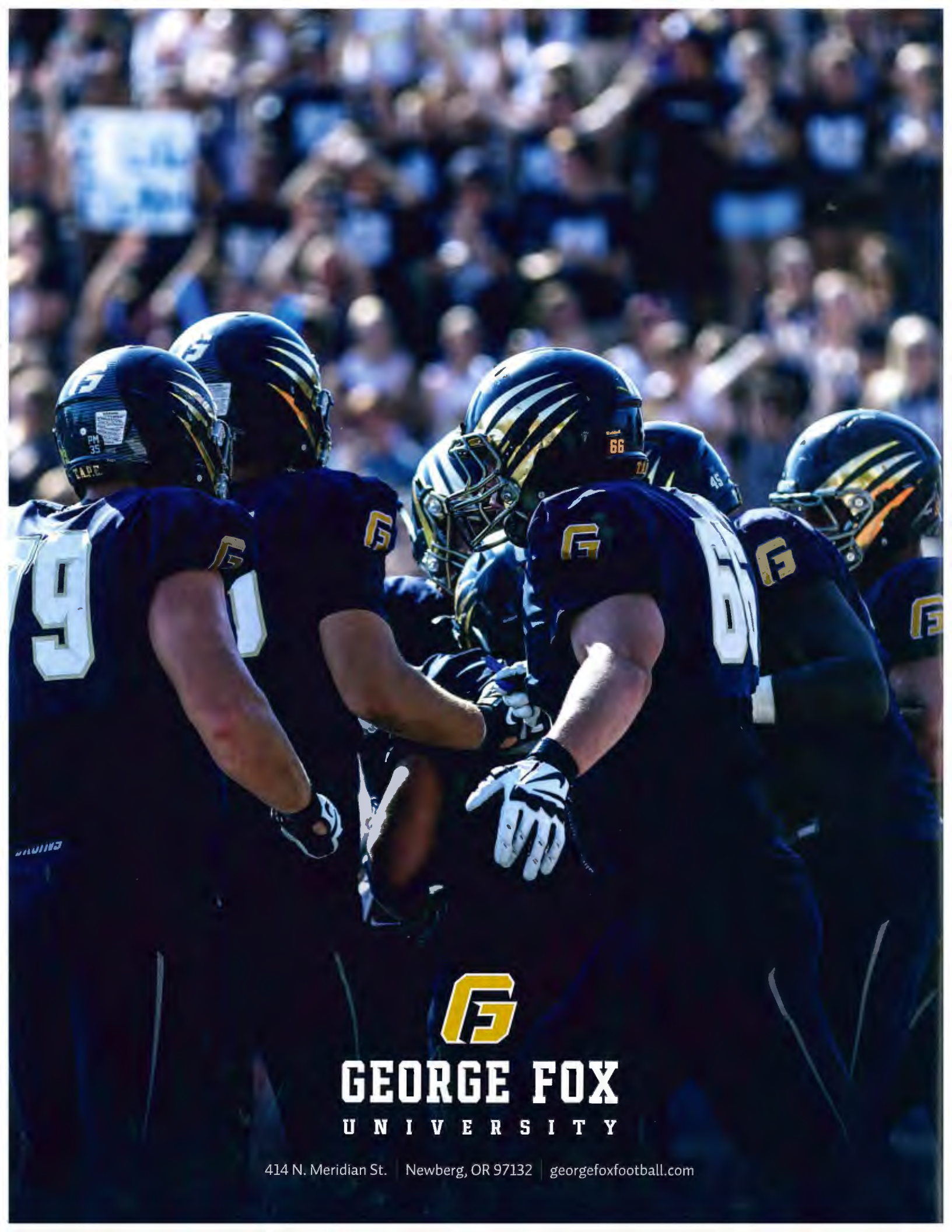
