Super Season in '99-00 Leaves Bruins Hungry for More

After sharing the Northwest Conference title and advancing to the NCAA Division III National Tournament "Sweet Sixteen" last season, George Fox University women's basketball head coach Scott Rueck summed up his feelings about 2000-01: "We are determined to be a better team than last year."

Others apparently think the Bruins *will* be better. In the NWC coaches' preseason poll, George Fox is heavily favored to repeat as conference champion, and is ranked 15th in the nation among Division III schools by Columbus Multimedia, an Internet Web site devoted exclusively to Division-III sports.

Now in his fifth year as head coach, Rueck has compiled a record of 72-30 at George Fox, including three postseason appearances, and he doesn't want the good times to stop now. "It feels great to be considered the favorite," he admits, "because for the previous seven years we were picked number two or

three in the conference. [Being named as the favorite] tells us that people recognize the work we've done."

Rueck was lauded as the NWC Coach of the Year last season after guiding the Bruins to a 14-2 league record and the school's first appearance in the National Championships, where George Fox beat county rival Linfield and California Lutheran before losing to St. Thomas of Minnesota in a sectional semifinal. The Bruins finished the year 23-5 overall and set records for most wins (23), fewest losses (5), best team winning percentage (.821), longest winning streak (11), and nearly every team 3-point record.

"Our goal is to win the conference again," says Rueck, "but we have a tough conference. We need to play with urgency and treat every game as if it's for the conference championship."

To make another run at the NWC title, George Fox will rely on experience. The Bruins return seven letter winners, four starters, three all-conference selections, and the NWC Player of the Year, Katie Lacey.

Posts

The Bruin offense will start with the inside game of **Katie (Greller) Lacey (Sr., Orange City, Iowa)**, whose off-season activities included getting married on August 19. Lacey led the conference in scoring (16.3 ppg) with a variety of low-post moves and an accurate shooting touch (.534 from the field). She enters her senior year sixth in career scoring with 1,122 points and fifth in career rebounds with 615. "Katie is the best post player in the conference, and maybe the best who's played here at George Fox," says Rueck.

Returning veteran **Tabitha Greller (Sr., Eagle, Idaho)** and transfer

Heather Doud (Jr., Corvallis, Ore.) will vie to fill the spot vacated by Wendy Clark's graduation. Greller, who is Katie Lacey's sister-in-law, was the Bruins' "sixth man" last season, filling in at both the post and wing positions. "Tabitha has developed her low post game and is one of the best 3-point shooters in the conference," Rueck asserts. Doud comes to the Bruins after earning First Team All-Conference honors at Biola University as a sophomore.

Returnee **Emily Ruggles (So., Eugene, Ore.)** could see some playing time at post, and freshmen **Christine McCandless (Fr., Medford, Ore.)** and **Darby Cave (Fr., Portland, Ore.)**, a high school teammate of Bruin wing Nicole Prazeau, could also see action as reserves.

Wings

Returning to the starting lineup will be Second Team All-Northwest Conference wing **Nicole Prazeau (Jr., Portland, Ore.)**, an athlete who Rueck believes is "limitless as to how good she can be." Prazeau, whose ball-handling

skills and 5-10 frame make her a scoring threat from anywhere, averaged 9.5 ppg, 4.9 rpg, and 2.1 apg last season.

Rueck also welcomes back "the heart of our defense" in **Jenny Freeman (Sr., Tonasket, Wash.)**. "Jenny is the most physical wing I've ever coached," he says. "She can take anyone out of their game." Freeman also plays a major role on offense as the team's second-leading scorer (9.6 ppg) and top 3-point shooter (49-138).

Off the bench, Rueck can call on transfers **Amy Fitch (Fr., Colfax, Wash.)** or **Shai Workman (So., Moscow, Idaho)**. Fitch joins the Bruins after an injury kept her from playing last year at Spokane Falls Community College, and is "one of our best athletes, who plays with the maturity of a junior or senior," according to Scott Rueck. Workman transferred from California Lutheran University, after seeing limited playing time two years ago and sitting out last season.

Point Guard

Up top, the Bruins have two-year starter and Honorable Mention All-NWC point guard **Becky Thompson (Jr., Colton, Ore.)**, who led the confer-

ence in assists-to-turnovers ratio (1.32:1). "Becky's developing into a leader on the court by being very vocal and leading by example," notes Rueck. "She's the best defensive point guard in the conference, and she's expanding her game offensively."

At back-up is **Jill Barram (Jr., Salem, Ore.)**, who would have broken assistant coach Kerry Rueck's school record for single-season 3-point percentage with her .486 mark if she had had enough attempts to qualify. "Jill amazes me with how quick she is with the ball," comments Scott Rueck. "When she enters, she changes the game from a pass-and-post setup to a penetrating and attacking game."

Pam Mavencamp (Fr., Eagle, Idaho) "will be redshirting behind two talented juniors to learn and develop her game," Rueck says. "She'll be way ahead of next year's freshmen when she starts using her eligibility."

Summary

"This team is an awesome group," Rueck says enthusiastically. "There's quality everywhere you look. As for team chemistry, this is one of the best teams I've coached, and that usually

translates into wins. With this much experience returning, we started practice three steps ahead of where we were last year. Our experience is our strength, and that's something you can't coach."

The Bruins got a taste of tournament play last year, which has only whetted the team's appetite for more. "We want to follow up on our success from last year," says Rueck, "and we hope to go further."

Tough Schedule Ahead

"Last year, against St. Thomas in the sectional, we got a feel for what it takes to make it to the Final Four, and it was a great experience, win or lose," Rueck reflects. "We're also looking forward to testing ourselves early against some of the top teams in the country at the adidas D3 Desert Shootout in Las Vegas in December."

At the Shootout (Dec. 19-20), the fifteenth-ranked Bruins will face No. 17 St. Mary's College of Maryland in the first round, and could also face No. 18 DePauw University or No. 3 University of Scranton, a Final Four team last year. On Dec. 29-30, the Bruins will travel to Katie Lacey's hometown of Orange City, Iowa, to play Dordt College and Northwestern of Iowa, the college where her father is a professor. Northwestern finished 27-6 last year and was ranked fifth in the NAIA.

Back in the Northwest, the team will encounter the usual rugged lineup of teams from the Northwest Conference, which placed four teams in the NCAA Championships last year, more than any other conference in the country. "Since we're the favorite, we know we'll be tested every time out," Rueck predicts. "But, knowing this team, I'd be shocked if we had a letdown."

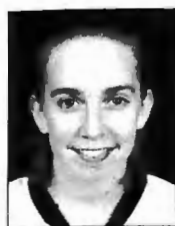

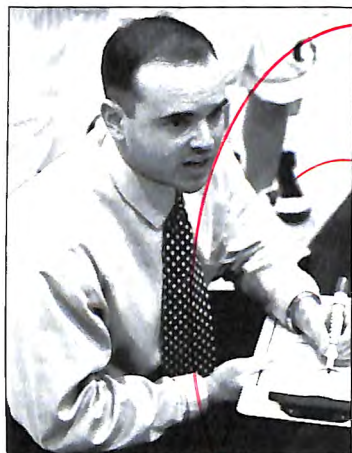

Coaches

Scott Rueck Head Coach

In just four short years, Scott Rueck has established himself as one of the brightest new lights on the horizon of college coaching — at any level. In that time, he has guided the George Fox University women's basketball team to a 72-30 record a .706 winning percentage), three postseason playoff appearances, and national recognition in the top 20 of the NCAA Division III.

Rueck's 1999-2000 Bruins put together the finest season in the program's 19-year history, posting a 23-5 record to set new records for wins in a season and winning percentage (.821). The team won 11 consecutive games at one stretch to establish yet another record, tied for its first-ever Northwest Conference title with a 14-2 league mark, won two NCAA playoff games before losing in the "Sweet 16," and earned a No. 19 postseason national ranking. For those achievements, Rueck was honored as Northwest Conference Coach of the Year by his peers.



3) Though only 32, Rueck has already gained 11 years of coaching experience. While still a student at Oregon State University, he began his coaching career as an assistant boys' basketball coach at

Santiam Christian High School in Corvallis, working there from 1989-93. From 1993-95, he served as a women's basketball assistant under George Fox head coach Sherri Murrell, during which the Bruins went 37-23 and made two NAIA postseason appearances. In 1995-96, he coached the Bruin women's tennis team.

When Murrell left after the 1995-96 season, Rueck was named interim head coach for a year, then was made permanent head coach after a national search that yielded four finalists. The Bruins have posted winning records in each of his four years as head coach, and their season record has improved each year. Rueck's players have earned four NAIA All-American and 10 All-Northwest Conference awards.

In addition to his coaching duties, Rueck teaches courses in the department of health and human performance, and he is in his seventh year as director of the Victory Hoop Camp for Portland youth.

A graduate of Glencoe High School in Hillsboro, Ore., Rueck comes from a basketball family. His sister, 1995 George Fox graduate Heidi Rueck, set the school's career, season, and single-game assists records as an NAIA All-American point guard. His father, Marv Rueck, was a longtime member of the basketball coaching staff at Hillsboro Union High School and Glencoe High School, including a season as head coach when Glencoe opened in 1980.

Rueck earned his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science in 1991 and a master of arts degree in physical education teaching in 1992, both from Oregon State. He lives in Newberg with his wife, Kerry, who played basketball for George Fox from 1993-95.

Women's Basketball Coaching staff

Mike Warmanen

Now in his fourth year as an assistant with the women's basketball team, Mike Warmanen brings to the program head coaching experience at both the high school and college level. A native of Forest Grove, Ore., he was an All-Northwest League point guard for Portland Adventist Academy before graduating in 1989. He went on to play two seasons at Walla Walla College in Washington state. He coached the boys' team at Portland Adventist Academy for three seasons (1991-1994), and was head men's coach at Walla Walla College for a year (1994-95) before coming to George Fox.

In addition to coaching, Warmanen is an athletic goods salesman for AllTeam Image in Portland, Ore., where he also lives.



Kerry Rueck

Kerry (Aillaud) Rueck, who married head coach Scott Rueck in 1996, is in her third season as an assistant coach for the George Fox women's basketball team.



Rueck first came to George Fox as a transfer from Skagit Valley Community College, and played on the nationally ranked 1993-94 and 1994-95 teams. Arguably the best outside shooter in team history, she holds school records for 3-point accuracy in a season (.414) and a career (.388), and for most 3-pointers in a career (119). She held team records for 3-pointers made in a game (5) and in a season (61) until they were broken in 1998-99 by Christy Brock.

Rueck earned her bachelor of arts degree in elementary education in 1995 from George Fox, and now teaches fifth grade in the Newberg School District.

Background on the Bruin Nickname

George Fox University's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887, two years after Pacific Academy (the University's predecessor) was established. The young cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton after its mother was shot. It was brought to Newberg and raised for a while as a pet.



After the bear grew to adulthood, it was given to Professor Roy Hartley, who kept it in a pit in Hess Creek Canyon, south of campus. When the bruin escaped one too many times, it was turned into steak for the dining table, and the bearskin was preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. By the 1930s, the hide had deteriorated, and eventually it was taken to a furnace room to be destroyed. The framework proved to be a problem in dismantling, however, and the pelt was left standing in a corner.

Some students "rescued" the old bearskin and later began skirmishes over its ownership, a tradition that continues today. Though the original hide has long since been destroyed, "Bruin Junior" has reappeared in various forms over the years and is fought over periodically in class competitions. According to the rules, which have been passed down for decades, the class that is able to drag the Bruin replica off campus is declared the rightful owner until the next time it is displayed or "flashed" on campus.

Today's version of Bruin Junior — a leather "teddy bear" designed to withstand the rigors of competition over ownership — has traveled to Europe and Australia, and stories abound of creative flashings and the spirited "brawls" that ensued. Only time will tell when the next flashing will occur and this longstanding tradition will resume.

Athletic Director

Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his 13th year as George Fox University athletic director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for a total of 27 years as a player, coach, and professor.

Taylor, 49, first came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, receiving honors as the Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1976-79, Taylor was the Bruins head baseball coach, while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He worked at a sporting goods retailing firm in 1979-81, but returned to George Fox as coach of the women's basketball team from 1981-93, producing a 162-155 record. He also coached the softball team from 1981-88 and again in 1990, compiling a 77-99-1 record. In 1985, he was named NAIA District 2 Softball Coach of the Year.

At George Fox, Taylor is responsible for athletic department functions, including budgeting, department and sports center management, eligibility, and compliance with George Fox, Northwest Conference, and NCAA regulations. In 1992, he was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the Year.

Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville and have three children: Leah, 26; Bree, 21, who played volleyball for the Bruins; and Casey, 11.



Athletic Department Secretary

Patty Findley

Patty Findley has worked at George Fox for 16 years, including the last three as athletic department secretary.

She is responsible for all aspects of office management, coordination of class schedules for the professors in the department of health and human performance, and supervision of the athletic department work-study students. A staunch supporter of all George Fox teams, she is official scorer for women's basketball games and works regularly in the concession stands at the Wheeler Sports Center and Morse Athletic Fields.

Findley is a graduate of Newberg High School and worked for the school district for four years before coming to George Fox in 1984 to work in the departments of teacher education and communications. She and her husband of 40 years, Jack, are active in the Friends Church, and have four children and seven grandchildren.



Associate Athletic Director

Pat Bailey

Pat Bailey is in his third year as associate athletic director, with primary responsibility for fund-raising.



Under his leadership, plans are well underway for a major renovation of the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Fields complex, which will result in

field improvements, grandstands, and lights for the Bruins' soccer, softball, and baseball venues.

Bailey has coached the George Fox baseball team since 1996, compiling a 142-61 record and either winning or tying for four conference titles. He was named Northwest Conference Coach of the Year after the 2000 season.

Bailey is also the director of the Bruin Club, George Fox's athletic booster club; he chairs the Sports Hall of Fame Selection Committee, and assists in game management for fall and winter sports.

and a teacher in the department of health and human performance after three years as a trainer at Kennedy High School in Anaheim, Calif. A



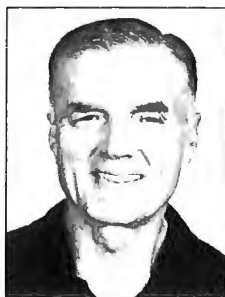

Sports Information Director

Blair Cash

Blair Cash, now in his second year as sports information director at George Fox University, is responsible for all publicity for the Bruins' 13 varsity sports. He also serves on the Sports Hall of Fame Selection Committee and the Dance Team Advisory Board.

Cash has headed sports information offices at Belhaven College (1972-77), the University of Montevallo (1977-82), and the University of South Alabama (1982-83). He entered vocational Christian ministry in 1983, but kept his hand in athletics as a volunteer in the sports information office at Texas-Pan American University (1989-94). He returned to the sports information field full-time in 1998, with a short stint as an assistant SID at Southwest Texas State and six months as SID at Samford University (1999).



Cash has been information director for the NAIA's District 27, the Southern States Conference, and the Mississippi Soccer Association, and a sportswriter for daily papers in Jackson and Natchez, Miss. As a baseball official scorer, he worked for the Jackson Generals for five seasons and the Birmingham Barons for one, scored the 1999 Southeastern Conference Tournament, and was the official scorer for the Portland Rockies this past summer.

Cash graduated from Belhaven in 1976 with a degree in Christian education and from Reformed Theological Seminary in 1987 with degrees in divinity and Christian education. An ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church USA, he has pastored churches in Edinburg, Texas, and Natchez, Miss., and is a pulpit supply pastor for the Cascades Presbytery. Head Statistician

Mike Wirta

Better known as "Biggs" by his friends, Mike Wirta is in his 30th year as George Fox's basketball statistical guru. The school's most loyal fan, he begins this season with a string of keeping statistics at 422 straight George Fox men's basketball contests and 362 in a row at home. The last home game he missed was in 1972. Altogether, he has seen more than 850 George Fox men's basketball games.

Wirta, 51, devotes many volunteer hours to compiling statistics and records for the players and teams recorded in the Bruin media guides. His vast knowl-

edge of George Fox sports history is invaluable in his position as official historian for the school's Sports Hall of Fame Selection Committee. He also compiles statistics for the women's basketball team and handles scorekeeping duties for the Bruins during baseball season.

University

The University

George Fox University, an evangelical Christian liberal arts college, is expanding, both in size and in reputation. One of the fastest-growing institutions of higher learning in the United States, George Fox has seen its enrollment more than quadruple in the past 14 years, increasing from 549 in 1986 to 2,636 in the fall of 2000.

Since 1986, George Fox has been named one of "America's Best Colleges" 12 times by *U.S. News & World Report*. In 2000,



George Fox ranked first in academic reputation and second overall among Western regional liberal arts colleges. The magazine also named the University one of the region's best values

among schools in its category.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, in which the University pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.

The school's history began in 1885 when Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy. It was during those early days that George Fox's most prominent alumnus attended the school — Herbert Hoover, who later became the 30th president of the United States.

The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction, and the name was changed to Pacific College. In 1949, because of the many schools in the West with "Pacific" in their title, another change was made, this time to George Fox College, honoring the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of 35 undergraduate majors and nine graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox University is located in Newberg, Oregon (pop. 17,355), 25 miles southwest of Portland, the state's largest metropolitan center of 1.7 million, and 32 miles northwest of Salem, the state capital.

Dr. David Brandt University President

David Brandt, George Fox University's 11th president, came to the university in August 1998 after three years as president of Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kan.

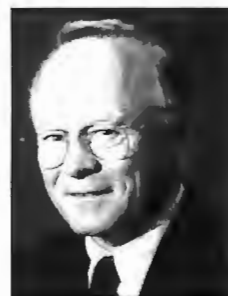
Brandt has international experience, traveling annually to Daystar University in Nairobi, Kenya, an institution he helped organize and for which he continues to serve on the United States board.

Brandt has experience at four other Christian colleges and describes himself as "a 'lifer' in Christian higher education."

He has been vice president and provost at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn.; dean and vice president for academic affairs at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.; a physics instructor and chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Gordon College in Wenham, Mass.; and a physics instructor at Wheaton (Ill.) College.

Brandt did his undergraduate work in physics at Wheaton. He earned a master of science degree in physics in 1962 from the University of Oklahoma, and a doctorate in physics in 1971 from the same university.

Brandt also taught physics in 1962-63 at the University of Omaha in Nebraska; was a demonstrator in physics at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ont., Canada in 1968-69; was a part-time engineer at Raytheon Co. in Sudbury, Mass., between 1972 and 1974; and was a consulting engineer for International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. in Roanoke, Va. between 1975 and 1977. His research there on fiber optics resulted in two patent applications.



Athletics

Wheeler Sports Center: A Natural Place for Sports

Entered by crossing a wooded canyon on a 200-foot bridge, the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education, home of the George Fox Bruins' volleyball and men's and women's basketball teams, is a natural place to play sports of all sorts. The Sports Center was designed by noted architect Pietro Belluschi to sit unpretentiously alongside tree-shaded Hess Creek Canyon. Built using gifts from prominent lumbermen, the building features a two-level oak parquet lobby and a large window area overlooking the adjacent natural terrain.

Completed in June 1977, the \$2.7 million, 55,000-square-foot complex is the University's largest building. It contains the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium, the Bruins' home court, with a total seating capacity of 2,750.

The Wheeler Center features a 116 x 174-foot gymnasium with three full-length basketball courts, three volleyball courts, and 10 badminton courts. The ceilings are 32 feet above the hardwood maple floor.

The building may be entered on two levels. The east-side ground level is accessible from the parking lot by crossing the footbridge. The on-campus community enters on the west-side second floor.

Contained on the upper level are a staff room, multipurpose room, classrooms, and athletic administration and faculty offices. A 1,500-square-foot weight room was remodeled in the summer of 1993. The lower level contains a concession area, dressing rooms, team rooms, laundry, equipment-issuing room, and storage space. An east wing of the building houses two racquetball courts.

The building is named for long-time Oregon lumberman Coleman H. Wheeler, former chairman of the board of Willamette Industries. The gymnasium is named for former George Fox board member James Miller and his wife, Lila. James Miller is also the former president of Cascadia Lumber Co.



1999-2000 Review

The Best Show Yet!

Winning a bid to the NCAA Division III Women's Basketball Championships in their first year of eligibility, and then defeating two tough opponents to reach the "Sweet 16," was the culmination of a record-breaking season for the 1999-2000 George Fox University Bruins.

Team Records Fall Like Rain

For openers, the Bruins tied a record for best start to a season when they won their first four games, including a victory over NAIA power Southern Oregon in the championship game of the SOU Stratford Inn Classic, perhaps the first serious sign that this would be a special season.

After going 7-2 against non-conference opponents, the Bruins opened Northwest Conference play with a loss at Linfield on Jan. 7, before reeling off a record 11 straight wins. The streak included two victories over nationally ranked Pacific Lutheran, and enabled the Bruins to vault to the top of the NWC standings.



Center Katie Greller was the NWC Player of the Year and the conference's top scorer.

After dropping a game to Whitworth on Feb. 18, the Bruins closed the season with three straight wins to finish 14-2 in league play and clinch the conference co-championship with PLU. It was the first title for the women cagers since the school joined the Northwest Conference in 1995. The Bruins also finished the regular season with a No. 21 ranking in the d3hoops.com national poll and a No. 3 ranking in the NCAA Division III West Region.

The Northwest Conference did not have an automatic slot in the NCAA Championships, so the Bruins had to rely on an at-large bid to make the playoffs. When the selections were announced, George Fox was one of four NWC teams to receive invitations, the most of any conference in the country, joining Pacific Lutheran, Whitworth, and Linfield. In the first two rounds of the tournament, the Bruins dispatched Linfield and California Lutheran, champion of the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, in home games at the Wheeler Sports Center, advancing to a four-team sectional playoff in Abilene, Texas. The Bruins' season ended in the Lone Star state at the hands of fourth-ranked St. Thomas (Minn.), which went on to the Final Four, but the loss served only to whet the team's appetite for a return trip this season.

When it was all over, the team had set 10 school records, including most wins (23), fewest losses (5), best winning pct.



The Bruins set numerous records in 1999-2000, including most wins (23), best winning percentage (.821), and longest winning streak (11).

(.821), and longest winning streak (11). On offense, they established new marks for highest team season 3-point pct. (.370), most 3-pointers made and attempted in a season (213-576) and in a game (16-31, at Lewis & Clark), and highest 3-pointers per game average (7.6). Defensively, they matched a school record for fewest points allowed in a game (28, vs. Whitman) and set a new record for lowest field goal pct. allowed in a game (.136, vs. Whitman).

George Fox led the nation in total 3-point field goals (213), was second in 3-pointers per game (7.6 to Sewanee's 7.7), and was eighth in 3-point field goal accuracy (.370). The Bruins' 16 3-pointers at Lewis & Clark was the highest single-game output all season in women's Division III basketball. The Bruins finished the year ranked No. 19 in the nation.

Greller, Rueck Head Individual Honors

A team doesn't put together a record-breaking season without good players and coaches, and the Bruins were blessed with both. Center **Katie Greller** was an easy choice for Northwest Conference Player of the Year after winning NWC Player of the Week honors a remarkable five times during the season, finishing first in the league in scoring (16.3), second in field goal percentage (.534), third in rebounding (8.9), and fourth in free throw percentage (.795). Greller tied for most votes received for the Little All-Northwest Women's Basketball First Team, and was named to the CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-America, District VII, College Division Team.

Starting wing **Nicole Prazeau** and point guard **Becky Thompson** also received NWC accolades, Prazeau making Second Team and Thompson Honorable Mention. Prazeau averaged 9.5 points per game (19th in the NWC), 4.9 rebounds (19th), and shot .728 from the line (11th), while Thompson led the league in assists/turnovers ratio (1.32, 100/76),

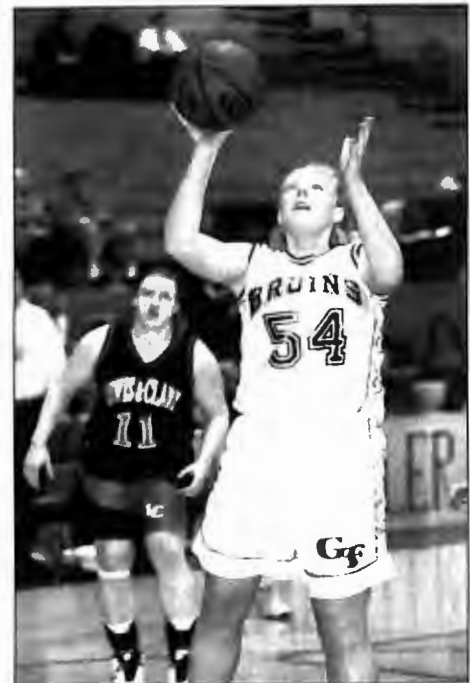
was third in assists per game (3.57), and 13th in steals (1.86).

Jenny Freeman finished second in the NWC in 3-pointers per game (1.75), seventh in assists average (2.71), and 18th in scoring (9.6) from her starting wing spot, and post **Wendy Clark** ranked ninth in blocked shots (0.79) and 16th in rebounding (5.2). Top reserve **Tabitha Greller**, Katie's sister-in-law, was fifth in 3-pointers per game (1.46) and 17th in rebounding (5.0).

Putting the pieces all together to make a great basketball season was head coach **Scott Rueck**, who was named NWC Coach of the Year by his peers. In his four seasons at the George Fox helm, Rueck has fashioned a 72-30 record for an excellent winning percentage of .706.

Bruin Fans Set Records, Too

It was a fantastic year for George Fox fans as well, who turned out in record numbers to watch their team. The Bruins drew 7,550 in 15 home dates, an all-time average high of 503 per game. That figure was good enough to place 12th nationally among the 396 teams in NCAA Division III, and was tops among Northwest Conference schools and all teams in the West Region. Some 1,800 turned out to see the Bruins win an overtime thriller over Linfield in the Homecoming game, and a full house of 2,350 watched the Bruins against St. Thomas of Minnesota in the West-South Sectional in the NCAA Division III Tournament in Abilene, Texas. Including road and neutral-site games, the Bruins played before 13,159 people in 28 dates, an average of 470 a game.

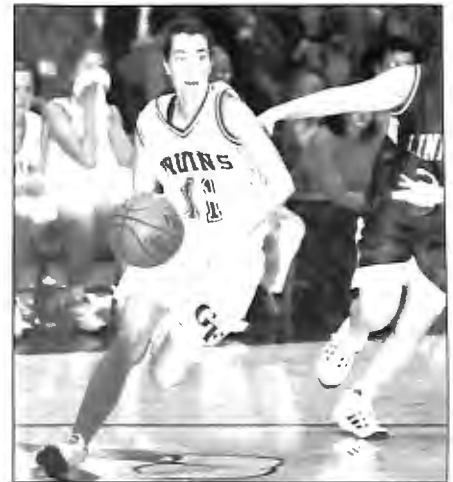

The Intercollegiate Athletic Program at George Fox University

Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, of course, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics. Accordingly, George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which need and academic ability, not athleticism, determine scholarships and financial aid.

At George Fox University, student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body, and spirit. Intercollegiate athletic competition provides for practical application of what is learned in the classroom and at practice. At George Fox, the values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes

- physical conditioning
- managing emotions
- courage
- teamwork
- cooperation
- being gracious in winning and losing

The University fields teams in 13 varsity sports, seven for women (volleyball, soccer, cross country, basketball, softball, track and field, and tennis) and six for men (soccer, cross country, basketball, baseball, track and field, and tennis). More than 15 percent of George Fox's traditional undergraduate students participate in these sports. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition at the same time. Consider the growing legacy:

- George Fox teams won district or conference titles in 10 sports during the past decade.
- George Fox athletes have earned almost 300 All-American and All-American Scholar-Athlete awards.
- Seven of the 10 coaches on staff have been named district or conference Coach of the Year at least once.
- George Fox coaches have held their positions for an average of more than eight years, and together have accumulated more than 1,000 collegiate wins.
